The city election is in progress today. It is passing off very quietly, the bad weather having a tendency to keep the total vote down. The only fight seems to be on aldermen, there being no opposition to the balance of the ticket.

The second heavy storm of the season has prevailed on this coast yesterday and today. The wind has been high accompanied by a heavy fall of rain. Some local damage has been done by the high winds, the principal damage being the blowing down of the mill shed at the Toledo Saw mill yard. Weak fences have gone down pretty generally before the wind.

There have been shipped from Medford station this season thus far about 40 carloads of apples, and there remains yet to be shipped about 20 carloads more of merchantable apples. This includes fruit hauled from Applegate and surrounding country. Two carloads of dried fruits of different varieties have been shipped eastward from that station, too, and about eight carloads more remain to be shipped, says the Ashland Tidings.
