> Another year has gone and a new year is upon us. The year that has gone has marked a reasonable progress in Lincoln county. Not so much perhaps, as many would have wished, but still a very marked progress has been made. The county has received a fair share of the immigration to this state, and the class of settlers coming in has been of an industrious and progressive nature. In Toledo and vicinitiy there has been a large inflix of hardy and industrious Scandinavian people. In Toledo precinct alone the populaiton has been increased by more than a hundred souls by the incoming of these people. For the most part they have bought small tracts of land near town, and have gone onto these tracts and are improving the same. Generally the increased settelment of the county has been satisfactory. Taken altogether the year 1897 has been as satisfactory as any of the recent years that have gone before, and the new year of 1898 holds out as many promises as the usual new years do.
