IT ONLY COST A DOLLAR.

Some people want something for nothing, and are not satisfied when they get it. An Elk City man recently saw an advertisement, "Nine Valuable and Money saving Recipes for \$1.00," and sent his money, and this is what he got:

To make orange extract, use oranges. Some people use turnips, but the flavor is not considered so good.

To split wood, use an ax. In difficult cases use your neighbor's wood.

To soften water, strain it through a feather bed.

To kindle a fire, use a gallon of kerosene oil and the nearest doctor.

To keep a cake, spill some hair oil on it; a handful of ashes sifted through it also helps.

To clean a brass kettle, use a file or buy a new one.

To get rust off knives, rub them on a brick forty-eight hours, then set out to cool.

To save coal, buy a wood stove or move to South America.

To keep strawberries, keep them off the table.

Here is an interesting example in the money problem: A counterfeiter recently devised a hundred dollar silver certificate so cleverly that it defied bank experts and fooled the sub-treasury people at New York. One of these certificates was uttered and put into circulation by the forger, who received one hundred silver dollars for it. That forged hundred dollar bill passed through twenty current transactions, performing every function that government money could perform. It paid debts, bought goods, was deposited in banks, paid out on checks, and did everything else any other money could do. Finally the sub-treasury people got hold of it and redeemed it with a gold certificate for one hundred dollars. After examination they pronounced it bad and destroyed it. Now who has committed the moral wrong outside of the counterfeiter? And are those debts that have been paid by this spurious bill really paid, and is the note received by the banker who loaned the bill a good note, or is it void? Who is out anything by it?

A sad commentary on the kind of men that sometimes get into a state legislature is furnished in the case of Griffith, a member of the Ohio legislature from Union county. Besieged and importuned by the Hanna and anti-Hanna men he has given pledges in writing to both sides. He is in the open market and the leaders are bidding against each other for him. He seems to be perfectly shameless in the matter and flops back and forth as often as a sufficient amount of money gets in sight. With such men in a legislature can honor, honesty decency, and a regard for the rights of the people have any abiding place there? Yet there are others that sell out as shamelessly as this Griffith does, but they do not do it so openly.

Both houses of the legislature in Ohio has been organized against Mark Hanna in his fight for the U. S. Senate. It looks like they have got old Dollar Mark beaten. He lacks four votes of having a majority on joint ballot, and the fight against him is getting hotter all the time. The entire administration is thrown in his favor and may pull him through.
