All of the star route mail contracts recently let in Lincoln county have been let to an Ohio contractor, and the price for every one of them is way down. The route from Toledo to Siletz, which calls for six round trips per week, brings only \$308 to the contractor. The old contract was \$496, those familiar with this route say that it cannot be carried for that money. If our home people will stand together and not bid for starvation wages this contractor will not be able to sublet his routes without a loss on each one.
