The disease against which he is making his unequal struggle is the result of a frightful wound received in the service of his country, and which for more than thirty years has made him a hopeless, suffering invalid. Now the unequal contest is about ended, and we fear that by the time this is in print the old soldier will have made his first surrender, and death will have gained another victory.

The bids for erecting the hospital building at Siletz were opened by Agent Buford last Saturday at one o'clock. There were but three bids submitted. J. A. J.
