Indian Agent Buford, of Siletz, has returned from Nehalem in Tillamook county, where he went in pursuance of an order from the Indian department, to make a payment of some money due certain Indians there. It seems that away back in the '60s the Nehalem Indians ceded a large amount of land along the coast between the Tillamook and Columbia rivers to the United States for a cash consideration. A part of this money has never yet been paid, and it is to distribute this cash that Mr. Buford goes there for. Meanwhile the Nehalem Indians have dwindled down until there are only about fourteen families of them left. In addition to making the payment of the money Mr. Buford had to trace the lineage of the several claimants to the end that no imposters be paid. This was no small job. The amount of money to be paid is about \$12,000, but of this the attorneys who have been working on the case will receive about \$2,000.

In the Carlson case there is a strong feeling that for a penitentiary bird that has just been released for one crime from the pen and commits two as bold burglaries as Carlson did, that one year in the penitentiary is a farce and travesty upon the name of law and justice.
