

A Town With a Prospect.

Among the many desirable points for the investment of capital and the selection of homes in Lincoln County, Elk City presents some claims of special value. Located at the junction of the Yaquina and Big Elk rivers, with a splendid site for a commercial and residence town, commanding the trade of two valleys with pure air and water and a tertile soil, she has all the natural and commercial advantages necessary for the building and support of a thrifty business town. For the next five or six years she will reap largely of the benefits arising from the improvement of the Yaquina harbor. All the stone used in the construction of the jetties will be quarried at that point. Prospective bidders on the government contract have secured options on all the quarries that can, be reached by barges. Samples of the stone from these quarries have been tested by the government engineers and pronounced firstclass for jetty purposes. A large force of men will be in constant employment and large sums of money will be expended there. This will create and sustain a large volume of trade, and also make a good market for all the produce in that vicinity. Home seekers can find desirable farms in that section at moderate cost. There is no better grazing land in Oregon than on the upper bay. Cattle run on the open range the year round without being fed and come out in the spring in fine condition. The hills between there and the coast break the force of the winter storms; and all the land being above tidewater, stock are subject to the chill of wind and water as upon the lower bay. Among the permanent industries which hereafter will form an important factor in the prosperity of Elk City, the quarrying of commercial sand stone uudoubtedly ranks first. No better building stone is to be found on the coast, and most of this stone can be loaded from the quarries onto the barges, greatly reducing the cost of transportation. The Pioneer Sand Stone Co. have one of the best equipped plants in Oregon and an inexhaustible supply of rock. Rochester, Curry and Kauke are just opening up the Bevins' quarry with some superior ledges of colored stone.
