The Three Reform Parties Unite for The Coming Battle.

The three conventions which convened in Portland last week, completed their labors on last Saturday, after having been in session four days. The result of their work is a union ticket composed of democrats, populists and free silver republicans. The platform is an earnest and patriotic utterance, and speaks in no uncertain terms upon the issue of opposition to the single gold standard and the national bank issue and control of the money of the country. The conventions were harmonious, and while their morrow they are not protected. deliberations were lengthy, yet they were marked with calmness and wisdom.
