REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION

Nary "Killarney Cat" in this Assemblage of Patriots.

The representative republicans of Lincoln county have met, have resolved and have parted. Their places in the hotels, boarding houses and on the street corners know them no more; their last sad farewells linger along the classic Depoe and stick thick and fast in the Toledo mud. The vanquished are still wondering what hit 'em; while the victors, flushed and happy, make vain show and boasting with divers scalps dangling as their belts. The ticket is well distributed—in the west part of the county, while the eastern half is given to understand that they have no rights which a republican convention is bound to respect. All day Tuesday delegates and candidates came pouring in to Toledo. The streets swarmed with anxious men who were willing to sacrifice themselves for the good of their county and country, and it is still a question as to which were in the majority, the candidates or the delegates. One thing seemed to worry official aspirants, and that was the unknown quantity in the Siletz; but when, as the shades of evening were gathering, Buford rode into town, closely followed by twelve other delegates, their doubts were removed and they realized the solemn fact that Siletz held the balance of power. Then there was hurrying to and fro, and candidates fell over each other in their frantic efforts to reach Buford. Tuesday night was a veritable Gethsamane to the candidates. From early evening to the wee sma hours they could be seen in groups of twos, threes and more in hotel corridors, in alleys, along the railroad track, in the shadow of the depot, and every place where a man who looked like a delegate could be held up. When, at last, the eventful day arrived, it was found that something unusual had occurred—that a destroying angel had passed through in the night and slain all the candidates that did not have the blood-mark on their door posts. The day before Toledo had four stalwart candidates for county judge, but they had been put into a re-tort, melted and run into one. By this method of killing off its surplus, the labor of the convention was simplified.

Promptly at 10 o'clock Committeeman Wadsworth called the convention to order and in a neat, golden speech raised the enthusiasm of the delegates.

Dr. Bayley, of Newport, was chosen temporary chairman, and McBride of Chitwood temporary secretary. After appointing committee on credentials, a recess was taken until 1 o'clock, at which time it reassembled.

The temporary officers were made permanent, with E. M. Mays of Elk City as assistant secretary.

The convention went through the usual forms of indorsing old platforms, McKinley and other old things, and then got down to the business in hand. The first trial of strength came on selecting a candidate for judge. Toledo, with her new candidate made out of four, felt confident, but the vote gave Stearns 54 and Sturdevant 20 votes. Just here Toledo and the east half of the county realized their helplessness, the Alsea-Newport-Buford combination was too much for them. At this stage of the proceedings, Crono displayed some fine diplomacy; he presented the name of James Ross, a resident of Toledo, for sheriff, claiming that he resided away off somewhere near the Cascades; the trick worked and Ross was nominated for sheriff. The contest for County clerk was fair and square between the combine and the east half of the county, and Toledo and the east half got left. W. L. Davis of Newport received 39 and M. E. Peairs of Toledo 35 votes. For Treasurer, there being no opposition to J. L. Hyde he was nominated by acclamation. There was a sharp contest for Commissioner. Toledo had a candidate, but Crono got up and stated that said candidate lived only two miles from town; that was too close and he was snowed under. There was a hot contest between L. E. Davis of Newport and F. C. Carson of the Siletz, the vote finally resulting, Davis 38, Carson 35. For Assessor there were three candidates, F. M. Wadsworth of Toledo, P. N. Lathrop of Elk City and D. J. Chitwood of Little Elk. And here Crono showed his hand again and scored one more for Toledo: he filed an affidavit setting forth that Wadsworth lived "way down the river near Yaquina," the fiction worked and the vote stood Wadsworth 48, Lathrop 20, Chitwood 5. For Superintendent of Schools there were three candidates, all from Newport: Geo. Bethers, Rev. Booth and S. G. Irvin. The vote was Bethers 49, Irvin 16, Booth 10. For Surveyor three names were presented and the ballot was as follows: J. Gideon 49, L. Powell 24, W. T. Webber 2. And now the feeble voiced chairman informed the convention that it was their imperative duty to nominate a coroner to sit on the carcass of the Union party in case it should happen to die. Wm. Alexander, of Toledo, was the unanimous choice for that position. Mr. Alexander is fortunate; if elected he will have nothing to do. This closed the arduous labors of the convention and the tired delegates, burdened with a consciousness of having done something wrong, groped their way out into the streets; but here an offended Providence was waiting for them and sifted great chilling baths of Oregon mist down their dilapidated shirt collars and weakened vertebrae.

Ross; Drift Creek, Arthur Player; Elk City, E. M. Mays.

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
