

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES.

Men Whom The Union Forces have Named For Office.

Wm. R. King, the nominee of the three union parties for the office of governor, is a native of Washington, having been born six miles from Walla Walla, on October 3, 1864. His father was a Washington pioneer and a prosperous farmer of that state. Young King remained on the farm until 18 years of age, when he entered the agricultural at Corvallis, graduating with high honors three years later. On July 28, 1891, Mr. King graduated in law from the Central Normal college at Danville, Indiana, and returning to the coast, opened a law at Vale, the county seat of Malheur huer county. In 1892 he was elected representative to the Oregon legislature from Malheur county on the democratic ticket, but after the session of 1892 severed his connection with the democratic party and affiliated with the populists. In the election of 1894 he was the populist nominee for joint senator for Baker and Malheur counties, and was elected by a handsome majority. During the session of 1892 he made a good record as a conscientious and able representative of the people. At present Mr. King resides in Baker City where he enjoys a large law practice.

Harrison R. Kincaid, on whom the nomination for secretary of state fell, is a native of Indiana and is 62 years of age. He came to Oregon in 1853, working on a farm until he entered a printing office in Eugene. In 1854 he founded the Oregon State Journal, of which he has been the editor and proprietor the past 34 years. From 1869 to 1879, Mr. Kincaid was clerk of the United States senate, at the same time editing his paper by mail during the time. Four years ago Mr. Kincaid was elected secretary of state on the republican ticket, but has not been in accord with his party since the adoption of the St. Louis platform.

Wm. M. Ramsey, of McMinville nominated for associate justice of the supreme court, was born in Iowa, 22 years ago and came with his parents to Oregon when one year old. After attaining his majority Judge Ramsey followed school teaching, studying law during his leisure time until 1868 when he was admitted to the bar of the state. At the June election of 1870 he was elected judge of Yamhill county, serving four years. Since then Judge Ramsey has resided at Salem and Pendleton, but in 1890 returned to McMinville where he has since practiced his profession and is recognized as one of the leading lawyers of the state. Judge Ramsey is a lifelong democrat, and was the unanimous choice of the convention.

C. M. Donaldson, of Baker City, nominee for congress in the second district, has been a prominent republican all his life, and has attended every republican state convention held in Oregon during the past ten years, but refused to accept the St. Louis platform, and with many other members of his party chose to follow the lead of Senator Teller. Mr. Donaldson was born in New York 52 years ago and for the past ten or twelve years has been interested in mining operations in Baker county.

Robert M. Veatch (Honest Bob) was selected by the democrats of the first district as their nominee for congressman, and his nomination was heartily endorsed by the other two conventions. He was born in Illinois and is 53 years of age. He came to Oregon in 1865, and is a graduate from the state ag-

ricultural college. Mr. Veatch is a successful farmer of Lane county, but for the past four years has held the office of receiver of public moneys in the Roseburg land office. He has served several terms in the state legislature, where he earned the title of "bulldog of the treasury" by his persistent opposition to extravagant appropriations.

Charles A. Fitch, nominated for state printer, is a populist and has been ever since the Omaha platform was promulgated. He came from Kansas to Oregon several years ago, and for a time conducted a reform paper at La Grande. Two years ago he took charge of the Oregon City Herald and made of it the ablest populist paper in the state. Mr. Fitch is 30 years of age and besides being a clever writer is a pleasing and forcible campaign orator.

J. L. Story, nominated by the populists for attorney-general and endorsed by the other two parties, has been a resident of The Dalles the past 13 years. He was born in Missouri in 1845, and came to Oregon when eight years of age. In 1864 he joined the Union army and served as a soldier until the close of the war. For a number of years he taught school, reading law at the same time, and was admitted to practice in 1881. Mr. Story had been a democrat until two years ago, when he served his connection with that party and affiliated with the populists.

John O. Booth, the nominee for state treasurer, belongs to one of the pioneer families of Oregon, and has always been an active though conservative democrat. He was born in Iowa in 1848, and when three years of age accompanied his parents to this state. Mr. Booth has been a successful farmer, merchant and hotel proprietor, and besides his farming interests in Douglas county, at present devotes a good portion of his time to the management of two hotels he owns in Josephine county, the Hotel Josephine and the Western hotel at Grant's Pass.

HENRY DENLINGER, JR.

Candidate for Prosecuting Attorney In Second Judicial District.

Among the bright young attorneys of Oregon Mr. Denlinger takes a front rank, and the voters of the Second district will make no mistake in voting for him. He is a thorough student, energetic and painstaking in his profession. His character is above suspicion and his dealings marked by the strictest honesty. He has the respect and confidence of the whole community and will poll a splendid vote in Lincoln county where he is best known.

Mr. Denlinger was born in Salem, Oregon, Nov. 8, 1868. His parents moved to Portland while he was quite young, and he resided in that city until four years ago. He graduated in the Portland High School, taking a four years course. In 1892 he commenced the study of law in the Law Department of the State University located at Portland, from which he graduated in 1894 and was immediately admitted to practice in the courts of this state. About this time Lincoln county was organized and Mr. Denlinger thought it offered a good field for an ambitious attorney. He came to Toledo, opened a law office and has resided here ever since. By close application to business he has succeeded in building up a good practice. He is married, has property interests in this county and is a progressive citizen. To a natural fitness for the legal profession he has, by exhaustive study and careful practice added an acquired

equipment that eminently qualifies him for the responsible position of District Attorney. The following taken from the Hillsboro Independent a republican paper, shows the estimation he is held in by those who know him:

Henry Denlinger, Jr., of Lincoln county has been nominated by the union silver forces for district attorney in the Second Judicial district. Mr. Denlinger is a young man better known in Portland than in his district, having resided there only about four years, though his interests and that of his father have been there for thirty years. The candidate is a young man of ability, force, and strict integrity, and he is a native Oregonian which is not to his discredit. The only objection to Mr. Denlinger is his politics though he no doubt hopes that with a majority of the electors in his district that objection will really be to his advantage.

THE UNION STATE PLATFORM.

"United in a common cause for the sacred purpose of preserving the principles of government by the whole people, in fact as well as in name, restoring and maintaining equality, under that government, of all classes, we, the peoples, democratic and silver republican parties of the state of Oregon, waiving all points of difference, and uniting for the purpose of carrying out the great underlying principles, and to the carrying out of which we solemnly pledge each and every candidate upon our united ticket:

First—We demand the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of foreign nations, and we are unalterably opposed to the policy of the present republican administration in demanding the retirement of greenbacks, and the turning over of the money-making power of the government to the national banks, as presented by the bill drawn by the republican secretary of the treasury, and endorsed by President McKinley, and we especially denounce the avowed attempt by said bill to fasten the country irrevocably and forever to the single gold standard.

We demand a national money, safe and sound, issued by the general government only, without the intervention of banks of issue, to be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private; also a just, equitable and efficient means of distribution direct to the people through the lawful disbursements of the government.

We demand that the volume of circulating medium be speedily increased to an amount sufficient to meet the demands of the business and population of this country and to restore the just level of prices of labor and production.

We favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

We demand that the government, in payment of its obligations, shall use its option as to the kind of lawful money in which they are to be paid, and we denounce the present and preceding administrations for surrendering this option to the holders of government obligations.

We demand that there shall be no further issue of United States interest bearing bonds.

We demand that postal savings banks be established by the government for the safe deposit of the savings of the people and to facilitate exchange.

We demand the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

We demand the Initiative and Referendum system of law making in its optional form, local, state and national; and the submission by congress of all important national questions for an advisory vote of the people, until such time as the national constitution shall have been amended so as to provide for direct legislation.

We condemn as dangerous and unjust the surrender, in all the departments of the government, to the influence of trusts, corporations and aggregations of wealth generally; and the packing of the highest courts of the land with corporate lawyers, too ready to do the will of their late employers, and to set aside valid and wholesome laws passed by the states and government, upon flimsy pretexts, at the behests of such institutions.

We are opposed to government by injunction.

In state matters we demand: A simple and well guarded registration law.

A more equitable mode of appointing judges of election.

Stringent laws to regulate the operation of fish traps, fish wheels and all fishing gear in the waters within the jurisdiction of the state.

We denounce and condemn the corrupt and extravagant republican legislative assemblies and charge that the republican party, in its eagerness for the spoils of office, has become divided into warring factions, to that it is incapable of government, as exemplified by the condition existing in the office of the state treasurer, there being at this time more than a half million of dollars therein wrong from the people by the process of taxation, while state warrants are stamped "Not paid for want of funds."

We demand that all district and county officers be placed upon salaries commensurate with the duties to be performed by them.

Inasmuch as railroad and other corporate property is not bearing its proportion of taxation, we demand that such property shall bear its just and equal share of the expenses of government.

SHERIFF'S SALE.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT BY virtue and authority of a judgment execution and order of sale issued out of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Lincoln, bearing date of February 17th, 1898, and under the seal of said court and attested by the clerk thereof, upon a judgment and order of sale rendered in said court on the 30th day of January, 1897, and entered on the 27th day of January, 1897, in a suit therein pending wherein Milton Hunt was plaintiff, and B.
