

CROP AND WEATHER REPORT.

WESTERN OREGON.

Weather.—The temperature for the week averaged 57 degrees, which is 1 degree higher than for the preceding week and 6 degrees lower than for the corresponding week of last year. The highest temperature for the week was 90 degrees, and the lowest 40 degrees. From one-half to three-quarters of an inch of rain fell from Monday to Friday, when the weather cleared and became warm. Frosts are reported from the foothill as having occurred during the fore part of the week.

Crops.—The change in the weather was most opportune. The cool weather retarded and checked the growth of corn and beans, it delayed haying and ripening of strawberries and cherries. Wheat on low land was turning yellow. The clear, warm weather has changed all this. Strawberries and cherries are now ripening rapidly. Haying has commenced and will become general during the week; the hay crop promises to be unusually large. Fall and winter sown wheat is heading. The spring-sown wheat crop is in much better condition than usual and presents better prospects. Oats are in excellent condition.

In some sections hop yards are being plowed up, owing to poor prospects. The missing hills is an unusual condition, which has seriously injured the crop.

The prune crop will be the largest on record in the state. Some growers are making arrangements to make prune brandy, thus utilizing that portion of their crop which can not be dried. Apples, pears, cherries, and quinces will yield enormously. In the peach districts, the peach crop is excellent. Grapes are making a healthy and rapid growth.

The vegetable crop is excellent. Green peas for table use are plentiful. Early planted potatoes are in bloom. All vegetables are making a rapid growth.

pasturage is good and stock is in prime condition. Except hops, not a single product has been adversely reported; and with the same exception, all are reported to be in a most satisfactory condition.
