## The County Officers Elect.

The new county officers that were chosen by the people of the county at the election last Monday, are as follows: County judge, J. F. Stewart; county clerk, J. H. Lutz; sheriff, Jas. Ross; assessor, F. M. Wadsworth, Sr.; treasurer, J. L. Hyde; commissioner, W. R. Wakefield; surveyor, Z. M. Derrick; coroner, Sam Van Pelt. These officers will take their seats on the first Monday in July. There will be a complete change in the county offices at that time, except one commissioner, Mr. Godwin, who will hold over for two years yet.

A letter from Fred Chambers, who is cooking for the crew of the Great Northern mine, near Canyon City, announces that ne is enjoying the best of health and is doing well. He sends the following item from a Canyon City paper, and states that it is strictly true in every respect:

The Great Northern mine at Canyon City, the property of Isaac Guker, continues to yield enormous sums of gold.

Operations in the shaft where the rich deposit exists have been suspended for some time, during which time Mr. Guker has had a force of men at work driving a tunnel and otherwise developing his claim.

Recently the water that had accumulated in the rich shaft while operations were suspended, were bailed out, and but little work produced nuggets to the value of \$1642.35, the largest of which weighed exactly \$944. Mr. Guker continues operation at his mine, and the reading public can expect weekly news of the enormous output of his property.
