

THE PORTLAND EXPOSITION.

The exposition to be held in Portland this year, opening September 22nd and closing October 22nd, promises to be the largest, best and most successful ever held. In 1895 and 1896 it was given under the auspices of well known business men of Portland, as it will be this year. It is conducted, not for profit or gain on the part of the committee, but to display to the people of the Pacific Northwest and to many Eastern visitors who may be sojourning in our midst, the wonderful resources of this favored portion of our country. There will be given prizes, consisting of cups, medals and diplomas for all the best and most meritorious exhibits of grain, grasses, fruit, (fresh and preserved) vegetables.

Lincoln county should by all means make an exhibit at this exposition. In the way of fruits, grasses, grain and many other products Lincoln county can make an excellent display, and no doubt can win at least some of the prizes offered. Space in the exposition building will be free, and there is but little doubt but that transportation for the exhibits will be given free by various railroad and steamboat companies. Let our people turn their attention to this matter at once, and begin to select such of their products as they may deem to be of good quality for the exposition this fall. With a little interest taken in this matter by our people Lincoln county can make an exhibit that our people will feel proud of.

The largest American flag ever made has been prepared to raise over Morro Castle when Havana shall be captured by the United States forces. A patriotic Wall street man has had the great flag made. It measures 120 feet in length and 43 1/2 in width. It is so big that special bunting was made for it in Boston. The bunting measured 42 inches across in the rough. Made up in the flag, allowing for seams, each stripe measured 40 inches. It took a full piece of 40 yards for each stripe, except where they run into the jack.

Hon. R. M. Veatch has returned home and will attend to the duties of his office until relieved by Mr. Bridges. He takes his defeat philosophically, expressing his regret, not on his own account, but because of the principle involved. Cast down, but not discouraged, Mr. Veatch proposes to fight the battle for American financial independence just as persistently in the future as in the past.—Roseburg Review.

The treasury department has decided to sell \$200,000,000 worth of U. S. bonds for war purposes. These bonds will be sold in denominations of \$25 and multiples thereof; they draw 3 per cent interest and are payable in coin. They can be paid after three years at the option of the government. They will be offered to our own people first.

The legislature is republican by 44 majority on joint ballot. The political complexion of the 90 members will be: Republicans, senate, 24; house, 43; total, 67. Fusionists, senate, 3; house, 16; total, 19. Democrats, senate, 2; house, 1; total, 3. Populist, senate, 1.

The Salvation Army has secured title to 285 acres of land near Mentor, Ohio, and will divide it into five-acre tracts and dispose of it to needy men stranded in the big cities, thus giving them an opportunity to provide for their needs.

The retiring county court must have been afraid that the incoming court would have nothing to do, and so they continued several matters over for them to look after.

Benton county went republican 100 to 200 on state ticket. E. Woodward is elected county judge; Virgil Waters, clerk; Peter Richard, sheriff; William Knotts, commissioner; John Gellately, recorder; Asa Alexander, assessor; Geo. Denman, school superintendent; J. D. Daly, joint senator.

An exchange says: There is said to be 250,000 words in the English language. It is reported that the most of them were used last Sunday night by a young woman in town who discovered after coming out of church that her hat was adorned with a tag, which was written "reduced to 50 cents."

A southern Oregon paper of populist belief gives its readers a cheerful account of the crop and stock prospects in that locality, and the Oregonian at once jumps to the conclusion that the recent republican victory in Oregon is wholly responsible for it. It will have to be something more than unusual that the Oregonian will not claim credit for in these days.

If, instead of saddling upon the people several millions of war bonds the republican party would coin the seignior age and issue greenbacks to the amount necessary to the prosecution of the war no power could possibly defeat its success in 1900. On the other hand if the administration follows the dictation of Wall street and issues the bonds the party will be in worse shape in 1900 than are the "Allen bill" legislators in Illinois at this time.—Roseburg Review.

Amid the wreck and ruin that struck the Union people in the state this year, it is a small grain of comfort, at least to know that the Union candidate for district judge in this district was elected. Judge Hamilton was elected judge by about 400 majority, and will take his seat on the bench on the first Monday in July. We do not hesitate to predict that Judge Hamilton will make a wise and able judge, and that the dignity and integrity of the judicial ermine will not suffer during his incumbency of the office. He will preside over the July term of court in this county.

The Portland Telegram says that Railroad Commissioner Eddy, who is stopping at the Perkins, thinks the next railroad built in Oregon will be the extension of the O. C. & E., from its present terminus, at Detroit, 40 miles east of Albany, to Ontario, a station on the Oregon Short Line, near the Idaho boundary. This, he says, will open up a splendid belt of timber in the Cascades and a vast area of agricultural land in Crook, Grant and Baker counties. His opinion is that if the war with Spain had not been started work on this 200-mile extension would have begun ere this.

The Portland Morning Tribune has passed over to the land of the great majority. After a varied existence it turned up its toes to the daisies the day after the election. The Tribune started bravely out as an independent, free silver advocate, and as such it received considerable encouragement and patronage over the state. At one time its subscription lists in several of the interior towns of the state exceeded that of the Oregonian. But after running that way for a time it passed into the hands and under the control of a ring of politicians at Portland, who immediately destroyed its independence and made it the organ of a clique. From that time it was doomed. The people of the state have no love for either faction of Portland politicians, and when the Tribune became the organ of the Mitchell faction it ceased to become a newspaper, and the people refused to further support it. It died, and its death was a very proper thing.

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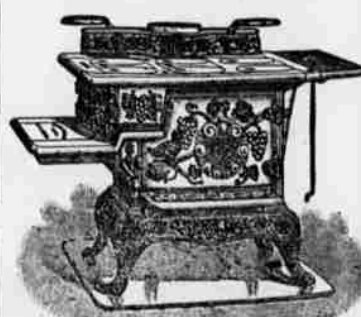
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
