### WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

Since Wednesday fair weather has prevailed over Oregon. The showery weather was of longer duration than usual; it has ceased, and no injurious effects will result. A very small amount of hay had been cut, which was injured to some extent. In some localities clover lodged to a limited extent. The rains delayed haying; as a rule, the grass was improved and no commercial damage ensues. Haying is now in active operation; and reports indicate a very large crop and of excellent quality. Royal Anne cherries are ripe; the rains caused some to split, but in the total crop the injured ones will not be observable. There are a few reports from the lower lands of the Willamette Valley that the wheat crop has not a healthy color; this, as a rule, prevails during wet periods, and it quickly passes away with the advent of clear, warm weather. The fall-sown wheat is in perfect condition in every portion of the state; spring-sown wheat promises to be nearly as good as fall-sown. Barley, rye and oats are equally as good as wheat. The fruit crop is heavier than ever before. Orchards are thoroughly cultivated, spraying has been more general than usual, and the trees are healthy. Canneries are being constructed in every locality to handle the large fruit surplus that is now expected. Strawberries are yet plentiful, but their season is passing. Raspberries and cherries are now in the height of their season. There is no improvement in the hop crop; the missing hills are evidently dead. Hills that are growing are most satisfactory. Hop lice have commenced to make their appearance. On June 1st, the Statistician of the Agricultural Department, Washington, D. C., states in the Crop Circular for June, 1898, that the spring wheat acre in Oregon has been increased five per cent., and that its condition is 101; the winter wheat was under "condition" 107. Since the first of the month, the condition has improved.

The summer type of weather conditions has not yet made its appearance. The reports this morning give indications of its early approach; with it will come settled fair weather, and possible hot winds east of the Cascades.

Seid Back, Jr., a Chinese boy, is determined to do something for his country, so has got up a company, known as the American-Born Chinese Boys' Brigade, of which he is captain. There are 40 boys, from 8 to 20 years of age, in the brigade and they are drilled every night by Captain Jones, of company G. There are a lot more American-born Chinese boys here, but they are employed in various places and cannot attend the drilling. The brigade will have a drill and dress parade at the armory of the Bishop Scott academy, Saturday evening. They have a handsome uniform, blue coat, white trousers and a blue kepi, with gold braid. In a few years the will be enough American-born Chinese young men here to form a full company, and they may get a chance to show how they can fight.—Oregonian.

Thewar with Spain is going to be a more serious matter than many thought it would be. The immense amount of red tape with which the army and navy are tied up with bottles them up almost as badly as the Spanish fleet is. Had Cuba been as far from Washington as Manila is the Stars and Stripes would have been floating over Havana a month ago, and Spanish supremacy would have been swept from Cuba forever.

### THE COST OF THE WAR.

At the outbreak of this war its cost was estimated at \$200,000,000, or \$300,000,000. Senator Hale warned his colleagues that this estimate was too low, and that a year of war would cost from \$700,000,000, to \$800,000,000, but his voice was not listened to. We now find that the war is probably costing something like \$2,000,000, a day. The deficiency bill now before congress, and which is entirely for the expenses of the war and pensions, appropriates \$224,000,000. The previous bills appropriated between \$150,000,000 and \$160,000,000, so that we may consider that for the cost of the war up to next January nearly \$400,000,000, has been appropriated, and there is not the least ground for supposing that it will be all spent. We may reasonably conclude that Senator Hale was not far out of the way, and that will cost over \$700,000,000, or nearly \$10 a head, for every man, woman and child in the country.

Co-operative farming is to be given a trial near Phoenix, Jackson county. Seven men, one of whom is married, have organized the Southern Oregon Co-operative Farm Association, with \$4800 capital. They will buy about 1000 acres and manage all business on the community plan.

It has been decided to hold the annual meeting of the Oregon Press association at Spokane, Washington, on August 25, 26 and 27. This will be a joint meeting of the editors of the states of Oregon and Washington, and there is no doubt but that the meeting will be both interesting and profitable.

A news dispatch to the Oregonian from Jacksonville, Oregon, says: "An examination of the county records shows a reduction of about \$4,200 has been made in the county indebtedness within the past two years." And Jackson county has been under the rule of populist officials during that period.

And now comes the Oregonian and tells us that the name Toledo is of Spanish origin. We don't believe it, and even if it is so, there are a whole lot of Toledos in the United States that have not a bit of Spanish sympathy in them, and one of them is in Lincoln county.

Prof. Thos. M. Gatch has been re-elected preident of the Oregon Agricultural college. Prof. E. R. Lake has been selected to fill the chair of horticulturist and botanist.

It is with feelings of deepest regret that we note that the Oregonian severely criticizes the secretary of war, and thus fails to "uphold the administration."
