He was indicted by the United States grand jury on three counts, for using three cancelled stamps. Dell Stuart, who defended Young, claimed that the stamps had not been used for the purpose intended previous to their being used by Young. And that they had been accidentally blotted or marked, and were then used and cancelled by him. This he claimed, was no crime, as a postmaster used his discretion in the matter, which he was entitled to do. It appearing that there was no intent to defraud the government, Young was discharged.

The first real taste of the war will come to our people after today, for it is today that the war taxes go into operation. On and after today every bank check drawn must have a stamp attached thereto; every bill of lading must have a stamp on it; every express money order or other draft must have a stamp attached thereto. In fact almost every public document must have its stamp attached to be legal. The first sign of this tax appears in the raised price of express and postoffice money orders. The penalty for the violation of any of the provisions of this act is a fine of \$100.

The Corvallis Times has the following to say of one of Lincoln county's settlers: "Lewis Southworth, the colored sage of Alsea bay, was in Corvallis over Sunday on business. Lew is an odd character but he is regarded as one of the solid men in his home community, and his ebony hand always finds the depth of his pocket when he hears of anyone in need. He was born in slavery and came to Oregon from Missouri with his master, James Southworth, in 1851. His kindly face, frosted whiskers and all give him the appearance of an ideal Uncle Tom. Lew was with Colonel Kelsey in his campaign against the Rogue River Indians."
