People of Yabuina and Newport want Eastern lobsters and soft-shell crabs planted in their waters of the vicinity. The lobsters and crabs are desired to be planted in Yaquina bay and at seal rocks, 10 miles down the coast toward Alsea, and Cape Foulweather, about the same distant up the north coast from the bay, it is desired to have lobsters planted. In a petition recently sent to Fish and Game Protector McGuire it was recited that the conditions there were favorable for the growth of the crustaceans, and that action was particularly desired before next January, in order that the forthcoming legislature might pass protective legislation.

The petition was signed by 21 of the leading citizens about Yaquina bay. Pr tector McGuire gave the petition his written endorsement and forwarded it to Hon. George M. Bowers, United States commissioner of fisheries, at Washington, D. C.

Mr. Irving Scott, president of the Union Iron works, of San Francisco, the establishment that built the Oregon, has sailed for Europe in response to an invitation of the Russian government, which wishes to own a few vessels of the same kind, and intends to get Mr. Scott to build them. This is a distinguished tribute to American enterprise and mechanical genius, but the present circumstances suggest the question whether American inventive genius and material endowments ought to be freely at the disposal of other nations. If we have a better process of ship-building, a better kind of armor-plate, a better style of dynamite cruiser, a more destructive weapon, it seems scarcely prudent to sell the products or the secret to our rivals. Possibly the government had better put an embargo on Mr. Scott.—Kansas City Journal.

## COST OF THE WAR.

### Our New Taxes Compared With Those of the '60s.

The main features of this law will naturally be compared with the successive revenue laws of the civil war period, and nothing will be more noticeable in such an examination than the large number of possible sources of revenue which have been passed over on the present occasion. The greatest similarity between the revenue system of that war and of this is in the stamp taxes. Nearly all the business documents formerly subject to duty have been included in the present act, though in many cases at lower rates than before, and a few additions have been made. But instead of a few articles now taxed under schedule B, the excise formerly applied to a long list of manufactures and other products, including such articles of common use as coal and oil, gas, candles, ground coffee and spices, cotton, sugar and confectionary, chocolate and cocoa, salt, slaughtered animals, furniture, umbrellas and photographs; and the rates were high enough to make a difference in retail prices. Over against the business taxes now imposed upon a few occupants must be set a long list of corporations which were formerly taxed from 1 to 5 per cent on their gross receipts and a still longer list of occupations reached by means of license taxes. Thus the tax on gross receipts applied to railroads, steamboats, ferry boats, toll-bridges and tollroads, telegraph, express and insurance companies, lotteries, theaters and museums, while the license taxes applied under the act of 1864 not merely to the occupations previously enumerated, but also to every other trade, business and profession. In addition to the tax on legacies, there was a succession tax applying to real estate. Finally, besides the income tax, there was a whole system of direct-consumption taxes on such articles of pleasure and luxury as yachts, carriages, pianos, private billiard table, gold and silver plate and watches.

It has been said that "contemporary budgetary history makes no like exhibit of unopened resources and unemployed powers." The new law serves rather to emphasize this statement than otherwise, by showing that even in war it is not necessary to tax everything taxable, or even everything which might easily bear taxing. The taxes imposed are certainly not excessive, and it is quite possible that portions of the act will be found so satisfactory that it will be advisable to retain them as permanent sources of revenue in time of peace, to take the place of the income tax, which has been declared unconstitutional.—Max West in July Review of Reviews.

It has been figured out that the banks of Oregon, in rough numbers, by reason of the war revenue bill, will contribute \$15,634 a year towards the war expenses of the United States. The bill provides that bankers employing a capital not to exceed \$25,000 shall pay a tax of \$50, and that those employing more than \$25,000 capital, including the surplus, shall pay \$2 for every additional \$1,000 of such capital.—Register.

A Portland man, who returned from Alaska after a stay of three months there, surprised his friends by stating that during that time he had bettered his condition \$1,500. He was told that he had done very well, and asked how he made so much in so short a time. He said what he had seen was worth \$500 to him and his experience would prevent him from going again, which was worth \$1,000 more.

## TIRED OF WAR.

London, July 7.—The Madrid correspondent of the mail says: There are persistent rumors here that Duke Almodovar del Rio, foreign minister, and Senor Gamazo, the minister of public instruction and public works, have received full powers to propose a suspension of hostilities as a preliminary to peace negotiations. The ministers neither affirm nor deny the rumor.

London, July 6.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says he is in formed that peace will be demanded today.

The Madrid correspondent of the Times says:

Dispatches from American sources describing the destruction of Cervera's squadron, which the morning papers considered wild exaggerations and consequently held back, have now been published in extra editions. They are regarded as substantially true, and have produced a most painful impression among all classes, but there is perfect tranquility.
