THE CELEBRATION AT TOLEDO.

A Big Crowd from all Over the County Celebrated the Country's Natal Day.

The great American celebration of the country's independence was celebrated on the Fourth of July at Toledo in old fashioned style. A perfect day for a celebration was accorded to this part of the country by the weather clerk, and as a consequence a large crowd gathered in this place to celebrate.

Owing to the late arrival of the Steamer Richardson from Newport and Yaquina the parade did not form until about 11 o'clock. At that time the parade formed at the junction of Hill and Second streets in the following order: Toledo Brass Band, G. A. R., school children, visitors and other people on foot and in carriages. The procession then marched to the grove in the west end of town where the exercises were held.

At the grove the program as published in the papers was carried out. The oration of the day by Hon. E. L. Bryan, of Philomath, was a masterly effort. It was sound in patriotism and was fitting to the times and the occasion. Mr. Bryan delivered it with force and effect, and all who heard it were greatly impressed with its patriotism and high principles. The other parts of the program were well rendered, the barbecue was good, the roast beef and clams being speedily disposed of by the hungry multitude, and the day was pleasantly spent by the visiting people.

WEATHER REPORT.

The following is a summary of the weather for the month of June as taken at the observing station at Toledo, Oregon:

Elevation above sea level 35 feet; mean temperature 61.4; maximum temperature 89, date 2th; minimum temperature 40 date 28th; mean of maximum temperature 71.7; mean of minimum temperature 51; number times minimum temperature 40 degrees or below, once. Total precipitation, 9.75 inches; greatest precipitation in 24 consecutive hours, 2.50. Prevailing direction of wind Northwest. Number of clear days 5; number of partly cloudy days 9; number of cloudy days 16; number of days on which .01 or more of precipitation fell 9; number of days on which .04 or more of precipitation fell 9.

The June weather was excellent for all kinds of crops, especially that of hay. Pasture and range feed for cattle has been abundant. The rain seemed to come in the right time and done all the good expected.
