One thing that looks very strange to the average flour consumer is this: When wheat was selling at 55 cents per bushel two years ago flour retailed at 70 cents per sack. Wheat is selling at 55 cents now and flour is retailing at \$1.10 per sack, a difference of 40 cents per sack. The miller's combine seems to have the state of Oregon pretty well by the throat.

B. F. Jones left a sample of hemp grown on the tideland near this place at this office. This hemp was planted about the roth of June, and now shows a growth of three feet. This represents only the growth of only a week over a month since it was planted. There is no doubt but that this hemp will attain a growth of at least 15 feet, as it will grow until October, and it is just getting started now.

The delinquent tax rolls for the years of 1897, 1896 and 1895, were turned over to Sheriff Ross by County Clerk Lutz today, and the sheriff will begin the collection thereon. His warrant commands him to collect these taxes at once, and delinquents should come forward at an early day and settle up if they wish to avoid costs, as the time that he can keep the delinquent rolls open is limited.

The April statement of the business of the Central Pacific railroad has been made public. The gross earnings during the month were \$1,330,400, an increase of \$319,810 over April of last year. The net earnings were \$536,114, an increase of \$165,334. For the first four months of this year the company's gross and net earnings were \$3,858,448 and \$1,246,476, an increase of \$214,309 in gross and \$152,557 in net receipts.

District court for the regular July term will convene in this place next Monday. The court will be made up of an entirely new set of officers throughout. Judge Fullerton, who has presided over the district court here ever since the county has been organized, has retired and the bench will be occupied by Judge Hamilton, his successor. Geo. Brown will appear as district attorney, Jas. Ross as sheriff and J. H. Lutz as clerk of the court. This term will be Judge Hamilton's maiden term, but there is not the least bit of doubt but that he will preside with dignity and impartiality. The docket for this term contains a few important cases, but the greater part of the docket is unimportant and will be speedily gone through with.

John McCluskey, one of Lincoln county's most energetic farmers, has been having an experience during the past week that tried his patience sorely. He had the misfortune to break a cast wheel on his mowing machine about a week ago, and he hurriedly sent to the Columbia Implement Company, at Portland, for another. It did not come when it ought and the anxious farmer wrote another letter. Still the fixture did not come and no word was received from the implement house. Overcome by impatience Mr. McCluskey telegraphed and received no answer, and then there was a mad farmer. Finally after several days useless waiting the casting arrived last night, and Mr. McCluskey was a pleased man there at. By somebody's carelessness he has lost five or six days of the best hay weather, and has been on the anxious seat beside. An answer to his letter would have cost the company two minutes time and a two cent stamp.
