A COMPROMISE MADE.

The Cases of Lincoln County vs. Jones et al., Settled out of Court.

Stipulations have been signed by the attorneys on both sides of the cases of Lincoln county vs. Jones, by the terms of which these cases are to be settled out of court. The terms of these stipulations are as follows:

"In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Lincoln.

Lincoln County, Plaintiff,

vs.

B. F. Jones, et al., Defendants.

It is hereby stipulated and agreed that the above entitled cases shall be dismissed without costs, upon the execution by the Plaintiff and Defendants of the following contract of settlement and compromise at the next term of the Lincoln county court, to wit, the August term next ensuing:

Whereas, there is a dispute between the said county of Lincoln and the defendant, B. F. Jones, and the other defendants, his bondsmen, as to whether and how much of the money of the said county has come into his hands as clerk of the said county and of the county and circuit courts therein, and whether and to what extent he is accountable therefor, and concerning the fees he has received for services as said clerk, and concerning the compensation he shall receive or has received as such clerk, and for the redemption of lands sold for taxes;

And, Whereas two actions are pending against said B. F. Jones and his bondsmen,

Now, Therefore, in order to settle the said dispute and all matters of difference connected therewith and involved in said action and concerning said monies and compensation, and every matter of difference connected therewith,

IT IS AGREED, That J. H. Wilson is hereby chosen as an accountant or referee, whose duty it shall be to examine the books, papers and records of the county and of the county clerk, B. F. Jones, and hear evidence and determine therefrom the following facts:

1. What amount of money the said B. F. Jones, as said clerk, received by virtue of his said office from the 8th day of August, 1894, to the 5th day of July, 1898, from all sources, segregating the sources from whence received, as from litigants in the county court, in circuit court, for recording instruments, for issuing instruments required by law to be issued by him, and for all business transacted by him as such clerk from which a fee or payment should have been received.

2. The fees that were chargeable to litigants and other persons under the salary act during this time of his services as county clerk.

3. The amount of fees, segregated by items, actually received by said B. F. Jones as county clerk on said fees, where he has received them in full.

4. A list of the services of B. F. Jones as county clerk, provided for by the fee bill in force in Benton county in February 1893, and the fee chargeable therefor under the said fee bill.

And it is agreed that the said B. F. Jones shall be chargeable and credited as follows:

1. He shall be charged with the amount of money chargeable to litigants and other persons from the 8th day of August, 1894 to the 5th day of July, 1898, whether actually received by him or not, and including monies received by the said B. F. Jones as clerk for the redemption of lands not accounted for to the county.

2. He shall be credited with the sum of money equal to the whole amount of fees chargeable under the Benton county fee bill as aforesaid for said time, less the amount already paid him by Lincoln county for such services.

3. He shall be credited with all the receipts of the treasurer for monies accounted for to him.

4. It is the purpose of this agree-

ment and the intent thereof, to allow the said B. F. Jones for his services as county clerk and clerk of county and circuit courts from the 8th day of August, 1894 to the 5th day of July, 1898, a compensation equal to what he would have received and have been entitled if the Benton county fee bill were considered in force in Lincoln during the said time and to have him account for all monies received by him in his capacity as clerk of said county and of said courts.

When the foregoing sums shall be ascertained by said referee he shall take the difference between them, and if the amount received be greater than the amount of his compensation, ascertained as aforesaid, that said balance shall be at once paid into the county treasury by said B. F. Jones and his bondsmen; but if the amount received by B. F. Jones as said clerk, be less than his compensation, ascertained as aforesaid, then the county court of Lincoln county shall execute and deliver to said B. F. Jones its warrant for the difference.

The said referee shall report to the county court at its first meeting after he shall have finished his examination as aforesaid, and in making of such examination he shall have the assistance of the defendant and of the county court in ascertaining the true results. And for his services as such referee he shall receive the sum of \$4 per day, which amount shall be borne equally by the plaintiff and defendants in the abovenamed suits or action.

Dated this 27th day of July, 1898.

It will be seen by the above that the county court agrees to give Mr. Jones a compensation for his work equal to what he would have received under the old fee system, and Mr. Jones is to account for all monies that have come into his hands during that time.

The county court hopes by this settlement to avoid all further and expensive litigation, and to get the county out of the tangle of lawsuits that it has been in for some time.

OVER FORTY-SIX BUSHELS.

J. N. York, a well known farmer of Weston, informs the Tribune that W. M. Bade, who has a farm near Milton, has just finished threshing a field of 230 acres, and that the yield was 10,695 bushels of as fine a quality of wheat as ever grew.

Scott Richie, who has an adjoining farm, got 6,720 bushels from 160 acres. Ambrose Wynn, 3,600 bushels of blue-stem from 100 acres.

"All this wheat," said Mr. York, "is strictly A1, and I know of dozens of others now threshing who are getting equally fine grain and heavy yield. I believe we are going to have this year by far the largest yield and the finest quality of wheat Umatilla county has ever produced."—Pendleton Tribune.
