JOHNSON.—At Bellamy, on July 29, 1898, Mrs. Oliver Johnson, of heart trouble.

Deceased was born at Gottenburg, Sweden, July 16, 1861. At the age of 10 she emigrated with her parents and settled at Ogden, Utah, where she has resided ever since until about three weeks ago, when she, together with her husband, came here and joined the Bellamy Colony. She has been suffering for some time past with heart trouble, and when she was taken sick death came sudden. She leaves behind a little boy 4 years old, a baby boy 2 months old and a husband to mourn her loss. The funeral was conducted under the auspices of the Bellamy Co-Operative Association last Sunday, July 31. Appropriate services were held, attended by a large number of neighbors and friends.

DIED.

GORMAN.—At her home in Yaquina, on Sunday July 31, 1898, Mrs. Louise M. Gorman, wife of Mr. T. W. Gorman, of nervous prostration, aged 44 years.

Louise Matilda Hitchins was born in Colman California, in 1854. In 1873 she was united in marriage to T. W. Gorman, in Colfax, Placer county, California. She with her husband continued to reside in California until about 12 years ago, when she, with her family removed to Oregon, settling at Yaquina, where they have since continued to reside.

The deceased was a woman of high character, a loving and dutiful wife and mother. At her death she left a husband and five children to mourn her loss. In her loss the bereaved family have had taken from them a loving wife and mother. She was a member of the Episcopal church, and had been united with that church for a number of years before her death, and her life had been that of a consistent church woman, abounding in all good works. She has been a sufferer from nervous prostration and rheumatism for several years, but her serious and fatal illness only dated to a few death before her death.

The remains were laid to rest in the Newport cemetery on Tuesday, and they were followed to their last long resting place by a large concourse of her friends and neighbors, who thus paid their last sad tribute to the deceased. The bereaved husband and children have the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.

A SUDDEN DEATH.

Last Sunday afternoon William Alexander and Jay Van Cleve went to the confectionery store of Peter McDougall, of this place, to buy some candies. Finding the front door locked they went to the rear door and that opened into the living room occupied by Mr. McDougall, and knocked on the door which stood partly opened. Not getting any response they pushed the door open and looked in, and saw Mr. McDougall sitting and leaning back on the bed. The boys went up closer to him to rouse him when they saw that he was dead. They immediately retreated and gave the alarm. Dr. Darnell soon arrived and made an examination of the body, and stated that death had resulted from natural causes. Word was sent to his daughter, Mrs. M. L. Campbell, and Mr. Campbell came down and took charge of the remains.

The remains of the deceased were interred in the Toledo cemetery on Monday.

The deceased has been a resident of Toledo for several years. When he first came here he was quite well to do, but he met with reverses and of late years he has been in rather hard circumstances.
