One of the first applications for a pension in the American-Spanish war will be from Oregon. The application is for the widow of Washington M. Darrow, died at Atlanta, Ga., July 16th, from wounds received at Santiago, July 3rd. Mr. Darrow was chief musician of the tenth cavalry, and was formerly stationed at Vancouver, and was once leader of the Marquam orchestra in Portland, where the widow now lives.

Elk City Items.

Rev. Poling, pastor of the Congressional church at Albany, and family, Mr. Beaman and mother, of Albany, and the Misses Nolton, of Portland, are spending their vacation here. They have established a camp on a beautiful eminence overlooking the town. The Stars and Stripes are waving over them and they have named the place "Camp Clark," in honor of the gallant captain of the battleship Oregon.

Mr. Langdon, cashier of the First National Bank, and Mr. Cummings, a druggist, of Albany, are on Drift creek fishing and hunting. They caught over three hundred fish in one day, and they report a splendid time.

The water is warm at this season of the year, which makes it very nice for bathing purposes.

They all seem to be enjoying themselves finely, in this healthful climate—free from heat and cold—a happy medium between the cold winds of the beach and the hot air of the Valley.

Fish Protection Bill.

The new fish protection bill which has been prepared by the fisheries committee of the Astoria Progressive Commercial Association to be presented to the next legislature, is now in the hands of State Fish Commissioner McGuire. The measure provides for an annual appropriation of \$25,000 by the state during the next two years, for the propagation of salmon. The bill also provides for the raising of revenue to carry on the work of propagation by levying licenses. The following scale is proposed:

All canneries and cold-storage plants must pay 25 cents on each ton of fish handled. Traps will pay a yearly license of \$15; wheels on scows, \$15; wheels stationary, \$25; seines will be assessed 2 cents a foot up to 500 feet, and 3 cents per foot for gear over 500 feet in length. Gillnets will be assessed \$2.50 each.

Besides the above, every man engaged in fishing, whether in a boat or working on traps, seines or fish-wheels, must pay annually \$1.

It is expected that fully \$10,000 per year will thus be derived. The bill provides that the state shall be divided into districts and that the money from licenses shall be expended in the district wherein it is raised. The great difficulty that has arisen in Washington over the expenditure of license funds will thus be overcome.

Should the bill become a law, the appointment of a state fish commissioner will rest with the governor.
