A SAD ACCIDENT.

Louis Ross Wiles was killed at Newport last Friday.

Last Thursday afternoon Louis Ross Wiles, 13-year-old son of Roy Wiles of Silverton, assisted by several other boys began digging a well in a sand cave near the beach, near Nye creek. He had not concluded the task he had set himself when night came, and immediately after breakfast on Friday morning he hastened out to his work, saying that two men had promised to help him, and that he would soon have his well dug. The two boys, his playmates, were again with him, and when they left the cave for a moment, about 9 o'clock, they saw the roof of it fall. Their screams of warnig to their comrade in the cave were fruitless, for with a rush about two tons of sand and rock fell completely covering the unfortunate boy.

The screams of the little fellows attracted the attention of two men, who were near, and these, without waiting to get shovels, began quickly to dig away the sand and stone with their hands, and in less than ten minutes the body was uncovered, and the work of resuscitation began.

Drs. Hamilton of Albina and Dr. Lee, of Corvallis, heard of the accident and reached the scene when the body was being taken out of the cave, and these gentlemen worked tirelessly for over an hour in hope of bringing back the life that had flown, but to no purpose—the neck had been broken by the force and weight of the sand, and all efforts were vain.

Louis Ross Wiles was born on August 16, 1885, and consequently lacked only four days of being 13 years old. He was the son of Roy S. Wiles, of Silverton, and Mrs. Rena Stinson-Wiles, of Portland, and a grandson of Mrs. A. L. Stinson of Salem. The body was taken to Salem on Saturday morning and was buried Sunday.

A GRAND PARADE.

Chickamauga, Aug. 17.—The review at Camp Thomas this morning was one of the most striking pageants in years, and one which will long be remembered by those witnessing it. Over 40,000 troops, in most gorgeous array, marched in perfect order. Nearly 50,000 persons were enthusiastic witnesses. At 8:30 a signal gun was fired and the long column moved past the tower and Snodgrass hill, where General Brackenridge and the guests were seated in the reviewing stand. The cavalry came first, the artillery next and the infantry last. Although the column only passed the reviewing stand once, the review occupied nearly five hours.

If the next session of the Oregon legislature does not meet with another hold-up they will elect a senator to succeed Mitchell. If the party could break away from corporate and other unholy influences long enough to look to the interests of the whole state they would elect Binger Hermann to the vacant senatorship. Binger Hermann has done more in congress for the state of Oregon than any other member of congress the state ever had. Hermann in the senate would be a power, and he would labor unceasingly for his people. But then it is useless to hope for Hermann, for the senator will be some corporation lawyer from Portland.

The contract for furnishing the flour for the Siletz this year has been secured by A. Wilhelm, of the Monroe flouring mills. There were several bidders, among which were the Red Crown Mills of Albany, the Corvallis Mills, of Corvallis and the Monroe Mills. The latter's bid was the lowest. This is the first time for years that any mill outside of Corvallis has secured this contract.
