From Kernville.

Kernville, Or., Oct. 17, 1898.

Editor LEADER:—

I see the road question is being agitated that the county should give aid to a road to Beaver Creek and a trail to the mouth of Siletz, each to go to Toledo. I heartily wish these roads and Toledo all success, except that their success should root the Siletz Bay people out of a little bit of help they very, very badly need. We are now trying to build a wagon road down the coast to the port of Yaquina Bay at Newport. God knows it is the only chance for us to get a wagon road out or even a good trail except the one to Sheridan, 48 miles distant. He knows it, for it was He that tumbled those mountains in there between where we live and where Toledo is built, so thick that the Siletz river has to double on itself until it goes 40 miles to get across 15 miles of them. They are not more than 400 or 500 feet high, but they are steep, and well covered with heavy timber and logs.

We love the Toledo people. They are good, kind, clever people. They are admirable, and they sell us goods cheap and treat us well when we go there. But the road is hard like that of Jordan and we are weary and beg permission when we visit them hereafter to go by way of Newport. God has left the bars down that way.

We already have a road made for eight miles south of the mouth of Siletz, and expect to have it so wagons can go through to Toledo by this route next summer. We couldn't build a road up river to Toledo in ten years. We have not but about three or four miles more of road to actually build on this coast route. We don't ask much from the county, only that they give us a survey, a road district and a 125 foot bridge across Rocky creek. But while the court is considering the building of a third outlet for Beaver creek and a second assault on the Siletz Gorge, we ask this much consideration for our outlet No. 1. There is not a great host of us, but we are badly isolated, and need, and I think deserve this much help. There are on the Siletz Bay twelve white families and about that many Indians. Last summer we cast 13 votes. Two years ago (fishing season) 30 or 40. Salmon River, the lower part of which goes with Siletz Bay, cast 28 votes last election. We also have lost not less than eight families of settlers for want of an outlet. As to the amount of good government land to be opened up by such an outlet, we present four or five townships that will defy competition with anything else in Lincoln county, in the state of Oregon or in the United States of America. We have an abundance of wood and water, fish, potatoes, the finest gardens, hay, grass, beef, poultry, butter, eggs—abundant blessings of God, but we lack those blessings of the general government and the county court, viz: legal tender, and a road and school district. And we ask that while "God helps those who help themselves," that our friends of Toledo and the County Court help those whom God helps. Give us a road and school district,

A Tuesday despatch from Paris says: Today (Monday) the conference reached a crisis for the first time. Judge Day presented the demands of the American commission in threatening words. He said that delay was the only possible object obtainable by the persistent efforts of the Spanish commissioners to saddle the United States with the Cuban debt, and would be tolerated no longer, as the United States would neither assume nor guarantee any part of the debt. The Spaniards replied that this placed Spain in a position of repudiating or of reducing the face value of the Cuban bonds from 50 to 60 per cent, paying only half the stipulated interest on the reduced value. Before they would adopt either alternative they would surrender to the United States the entire Philippines. Judge Day responded that the surrender of the Philippines would probably be demanded, irrespective of the Cuban or any other debt. This, to the Spaniards, the first intimation of the intentions of the United States as to the Philippines, resulted in a whispered conference, followed by a request for an adjournment in order to communicate with Madrid. Judge Day said that President McKinley had instructed him to demand the entire surrender of Porto Rico tomorrow, and the delivery of every town to the United States officers before midnight, together with the evacuation of Havana on or before November 1, when the United States would be at the gates of the city ready to take possession. There was no alternative offered in the case of either of these demands; the session consequently was very brief."

When the bill to abolish the state equalization board was being debated in the senate it was argued and generally understood that it would do away with the expensive requirement that the county clerks transmit to the secretary of state certified transcripts of the assessment rolls. It is now discovered that the requirement is in no wise interfered with by the repeal. While the whole of the act providing for the state equalization board is repealed, section 2788 of the statutes, pertaining to the levy of taxes, is the one requiring transcripts of the rolls, and it has not been touched. No other way is provided by law for informing the secretary of state of the amounts of the various county assessment rolls, upon which information the governor, secretary of state and treasurer base the state levy. The transcripts are more expensive than the annual sittings of the equalization board, and there is absolutely no use for them now, except for the one fact of the total of taxable valuation contained in their summaries—Oregonian. That can be remedied at the regular session and not much time will have been lost.
