The Sailors' Report.

The three surviving sailors of the wrecked ship, Atlanta, George Frazer, Francis McMahon and Jno. Webber, enroute to Portland, on Wednesday, were interviewed in a brief way by a LEADER reporter.

They say the Oregonian report was full of errors and did great injustice to Captain Clark and his crew of the Yaquina Life Saving station. No one of the survivors was unconscious at any time, but all three came out of the surf and "shirt-tailed" it across the beach in search of shelter. When the ship struck the reef, she at once broke in two, and the bow was totally crushed and sank. The stern also sank, but the crew had been ordered on deck and, hence, no one was penned in the fore-castle, whom the life-saving crew could rescue.

Captain Clark says the reporter did not see any of his men till after the report was published. He saw Frank Forgarty, not one of the crew, and reported him as a member of the crew. Captain Clark is indignant at the report sent in because it was largely false and unjust to the men, the government and himself. We are personally acquainted with the members of the crew and will wager our all that they left no stone unturned to do everything possible to human strength to save life and property. They are no chickens.
