There will be the smallest number of democrats in the United States senate after March 4th, next, than there has been for 26 years. The number will be only twenty-six. In the elections of 1872 the democrats got only 20 senators. But that was 20 out of a senate of 74 members. In the elections of 1874 this representation was raised to 29. And since then the democrats have always had just a few more than the republicans. Twenty-one of these 26 senators will be from Southern states.—East Oregonian.

beef cattle sold was 8,447, at an average price of \$26 per head, or \$219,622. A total of 31,500 head of sheep have been sold for mutton at an average price of \$2.75, or \$85,250. The greater part of the mutton sheep are yet in the county, unsold. One million pounds of wool have also been sold at an average price of 12½ cents, which amounts to \$125,000.

SPAIN YIELDS.

Question Practically Settled.

Paris, Nov. 28—Spain has acceded to the demands of the United States, and agreed to cede the entire Philippine archipelago and the Sulu islands, and to sell the Caroline islands. This practically insures the conclusion of a treaty of peace between Spain and the United States in the near future.

Senator Daly returned yesterday afternoon from Portland, where for a week past the special committee of the legislature that has in hand the revision of the school laws of Oregon has been in session. The committee has accomplished much, and will have a completed law ready for consideration at the regular session.—Times.

The manufacture of tin plate in this country calls for 1,000,000 tons of iron ore, 300,000 tons of limestone, 2,000,000 tons of coal and coke, 400,000 tons of pig iron, 5,500,000 pounds of lead, 13,000,000 pounds of tallow and oil, 40,000,000 pounds of sulphuric acid, and 12,000,000 feet of lumber. It gives employment to 35,000 persons.
