Whisky on the Siletz.

Thanksgiving night there took place on the Siletz a social dance at which a number of the boys evinced signs of having smelled too often the cork of some bottle containing some form of ardent spirits. They became hilarious and complaint was made. Agent Buford at once began looking for the guilty parties and seven were thought to be implicated and warrants were drawn for their arrest and trial.

Those suspected were John Grenier senior and junior, James and Robert Tronson, Louie Smith, Pellet Lane and Al Reed. Deputy United States Marshal Morse brought them to Toledo Saturday for trial, having a few days before sent to Sheriff Ross to detain James Tronson, who was at Newport, until he should arrive.

Saturday afternoon the trial took place at the court house before Commissioner J. A. Hall, with Attorney Jones for the prosecution and H. Denlinger for the defense. The trial occupied the entire afternoon and resulted in the discharge of all but Al Reed, who was bound over to appear before the U. S. grand jury when called, under bonds of \$100.

Agent Buford is determined to put a stop to the practice of taking liquor on the reservation and giving it to his people, and, as he is upheld by very strict laws, it is only matter of time till those guilty of this violation of a United States law will be found and severely punished.
