The Commissioners' County Court met in adjourned session Wednesday morning, January 4, 1899. The following business was transacted:

In the matter of Ned Evans as supervisor of road district No. 2, report continued till next regular term.

John Adams was appointed road supervisor of road district No. 2. Court adjourned for the term.
