Hon. Nelson Dingley, of Maine, for many years a republican senator and father of the Dingley tariff bill, died January 13, at 10:30 o'clock of pneumonia, at Washington.

The state tax levy for 1899 is 5 and seven-tenths mills as against 3½ last year. With the most rigid economy in county and city expenses the levy upon our people this year will be high.

The point of keeping the doubtful appropriations separate from those necessary is a good point made by the present legislature. It will be the means of neatly winnowing the wheat from the chaff, and thus saving our state thousands of dollars every session in future.

The bill introduced by Davis preventing quarry companies, mining companies and corporations from operating stores and boarding companies is certainly unconstitutional. If a corporation pays for its goods no power under our constitution can prevent it from doing any legitimate business.

The present session of legislature will prove to be unsatisfactory and expensive, because the members have no important issue upon which to work, and so the old adage about Satan and mischief and idle hands will prove true. The present active membership of these bodies cannot but do something.

Of course many people will severely censure H. R. Kincaid for collecting a muty-dollar subscription bill, but he should be pardoned. No man should blame an editor, who has spent many years in a country newspaper office, for chasing down a delinquent subscriber. It was doubtless force of habit more than a desire to beat the state.

Bills of Interest.

The following bills that interest our people have been introduced in the house:

Topping, to provide for health officers at Gardiner, Yaquina and Bandon, with duties similar to those of the present health officers at Astoria, each to receive \$400 per year.

Davis, prohibiting mining, quarry companies and other corporations from conducting company stores.

Young, to amend section 2788 of code, making it necessary to transmit only a summary of assessment roll to secretary of state.

Hill, amending the code so that administrators of estates may pay funeral and doctor's bills without waiting for the expiration of six months.

Roberts, to authorize county officers to sell property for delinquent taxes after advertising the same without posting notices on the property.

Curtis, to prohibit false labeling of salmon fish, fruits and other Oregon products.

Myers, changing the fishing season on Alsea bay, river and tributaries.

Young, assessment and collection of taxes.

Grace, repealing section 2733 and 2835 of code—poll tax.

Curtis, appropriating \$25,000 per annum for the propagation of salmon.

Moody, authorizing counties to fund indebtedness by bonding.

Davis, protecting transplanted Eastern oysters.

The above are but twelve of the 119 read in the house Thursday from one o'clock till 4:30. There seems to be diarrhea of bills thus far, and it is to be sincerely hoped it may be checked before becoming chronic.

And much of the cause, disagreeable as it is to say it, lies with our women who have of late allowed their lives to become too full. I will not say that they have neglected, to any alarming extent, the fundamental duties of wifehood and motherhood. But I do say that the danger of doing so in the very near future exists, in many an instance, if things are allowed to go on as they have gone."
