EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

The initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution has passed the senate and house and now only awaits the action of the next legislature to be operative. The Populists will now flock to the republican ranks in large wads, because the republican legislature passed their pet scheme.

Legislative Doings.

Saturday ended four week's session of legislature. During that time the senate had introduced 224 bills and the house 371. The senate had passed 62 of its own bills and the house 88. Only 17 bills had passed both houses, and these were nearly all incorporating towns or amending the present charters of different cities. The heavy work of making good laws or good amendments to present laws has to come yet. The Adams dog tax law was lost properly enough in the senate. Its death was properly caused as it was a bad act. Our people will be glad to hear of its demise. The bill authorizing county courts to fund county floating debts was amended by the house but is yet lame in that it does not make the transaction a public one, but allows the judges make private bargains. This should not be. To advertise for bids would be the proper way to do the business. We believe it a good bill when so amended, and would like to see it passed as it would save our taxpayers many dollars in interest every year.
