EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

Those Problems.

Whether a citizen favors or opposes the building of a court house at present is none of our business, and is also his privilege, but he should make honest figures if he makes any. A Waldport man publishes these figures in the News.

Rent \$240 per year for ten years, \$2400. This he uses as total cost of present method.

Court house \$3,000, interest at 6 per cent 10 years, \$1,800, total \$4,800, a loss in expense to taxpayers of \$2,400. No wonder some folks are poor! This system of calculation would starve a man to death in a year and make public charges of his family. The present expense of \$240 per year, ten years with interest on half the amount for the whole time at 6 per cent amounts to \$3,120. This is an expense account—nothing else.

On the other hand, we have a court house, \$3,000, interest at 6 per cent for time, \$1,800, amount, \$4,800. On this account we have the former amount, \$3,120 to apply leaving a remainder of \$1,680, and what have we for this remainder?

To show for it the taxpayers have a court house worth at that time, say \$1,500 and grounds worth at that time \$2,000 or a total of \$3,500, for which the county has paid \$1,680.

Is there anything false about these figures? If so, in what does it consist?

To say THE LEADER was surprised, and very pleasantly withal, at the position taken by the Yaquina Bay News, in the matter of the erection of a court house at Toledo, is not overdrawing it. It is supposed to voice the sentiment of the people of Newport, and we hope it does, for the move has many strong points in its favor, but sentiment has changed in the Resort City if the News is correct. Not longer ago than in June Newport people made the point in favor of Judge Stearns that he did not favor a court house, and if the building of it were deferred, it would be less trouble to procure an enabling act later on, when the Resort City might feel like trying the question again. Hence our slowness to believe the statements of the News to be the sentiment of the people of Newport. Toledo people winked their eyes when they discussed the article and acted as if they knew the cause of the apparent change of heart, but THE LEADER does not know anything about it, but is certain the News will have to be consistent in its future articles on the subject else there will a question of honesty of purpose arise in the minds of many of its readers which will not be put down. Time will undoubtedly vindicate the News and we certainly hope it may.

The Salem Sentinel, in an article on the reforms of Switzerland, closes with this sentence. "Luckily the whole world is not the hell of poverty that England and United States present. There are bright spots that are already enlarging over the geographies of nations." The editor needs a purgative dose

of cathartics to clear his liver. He would last quickly in those countries not hells like United States; for instance, Russia. It is a mystery why intelligent men rant like this. They know it is false. They are talking for gain—for money. Such men will never allay the poverty(?) of United States, but aggravate it.

THE LEADER received a lengthy communication from J. B. Zeigler this week, but does not publish it for several reasons. It would occupy too much space, is a matter of the publication of which would be of benefit to none but himself, and the LEADER can explain in less space. The county court reports him as having presented a petition for his appointment as road supervisor. This he does not take kindly. The petition is signed by quite a number of persons, and about two-thirds of the signatures are in his writing, the authority to do this being written and attached to the petition. The court looks askance at this kind of work, because Mr. Zeigler's neighbors some of them say they did not know they signed any paper asking his appointment. Mr. Zeigler has labored hard to secure the road in question and his district certainly deserves an outlet, but the county court has done all it could and we can see no just cause of complaint on the part of Mr. Zeigler. Justice as we see it requires no more than this.

Governor Geer has been asked to repeal the bill creating the office of tax-collector in Portland. Nearly all the prominent men and business firms of the city have signed the petition.

Many papers are kicking because the appropriations of the special and regular sessions footed up and passed the million-dollar mark. It does seem a little steep; a good price for so small a whistle, but on the other hand there's nothing like living in a million-dollar state, and Oregon is surely that state—a'most.

February 18th the French assembly met and elected Emile Loubet president of the French republic to fill the vacancy of President Faure. The presidency of France at the present time is an unenviable position, and if President Loubet brings system and order out of the present chaotic state of that country he will merit the applause of his fellow countrymen and the world.

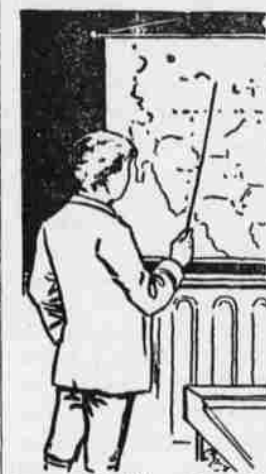

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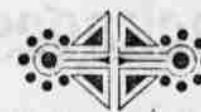
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
