EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

As we go to press the fate of the Yaquina appropriation is doubtless being decided at Washington.

Congress, the supreme law-making power of this nation, will adjourn tomorrow. There will be no extra session.

California is again praying for rain and should none come soon there will be hard times this year for Californians.

For delicious broiled oysters dry and season the oysters as for frying. Have ready a wire broiler and a good clear fire; arrange the oysters, broil a minute on one side; turn, and broil on the other. Put them into a hot dish; add a tablespoonful of butter, a tablespoonful of lemon juice, and a dusting of salt and red pepper to each twenty-five oysters. —Ladies' Home Journal.

The senators and representatives from the extreme East, who have opposed the Nicaragua canal during this session, will have a hard time squaring themselves with their constituents at home. A more meritorious project was never murdered selfishly in congress than this same canal. There is one bright side to the West,—the matter is only delayed—the people command it and it must be done.

There are those who say Oregon has no representation in congress. These people are doubtless sincere in what they say, but THE LEADER cannot see how a reasonable person can really think so. Every question before congress has its dark days and the Yaquina contract has had its dark day with other merited projects. Yet the whole matter has shown all through its history in the present congress a studied, thoughtful and careful handling. When the repeal passed the house, those referred to above were loud in their denunciation of Thos. H. Tongue, but later events have proved the wisdom of his action. If a success was to result at all, it could not occur from a fight in the house early in the session. Senators McBride and Simon have both been in close touch with Oregon's representatives, and the absence of a fight in the house was at their advice and was certainly wise, no matter how it appeared at the time. Hence, taking the matter as an entirety no reasonable man could expect more from Oregon's delegation than has been accomplished.

As It Is, and Has Been.

Editor LEADER:

As the hunter and his dog seem to be occupying the minds of a good many Lincoln county people at the present time, I beg space in your valuable paper for our side of the question.

To start with I will go back several years. We thought we would put a stop to hunting in this vicinity, and a few of the boys did just like our friends at Chitwood, they went to killing dogs. The owners of these dogs claimed that they would have revenge; that they would come back and kill a cow for every dog that they lost.

But they did not. They left us to suffer a worse fate. Hunting was stopped and the wild animals came in and did the killing for them. We had to corral our sheep at night. One of my neighbors slept by his corral, and then a bear got in one night and killed some sheep for him. He was a single man then, and it is supposed that he went to see his girl that night. The best we could do was to keep our original band good, and all the increase went to the wild animals.

Now you can imagine how we welcome back our valued friends, the hunter and his dog. Last year the sheepowners sold his increase which ranged from 25 to 100 head for from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per head. Now when a hungry and tired dog comes along we feed him all he can eat.

Now in conclusion I would like to ask one question. Are we, the people of this county, going to start a park and have it full of all kinds of wild animals, and wear patched overalls all the days of our life, and have nothing to eat but bread and potatoes? If so let us kill all the dogs; if not, let the hunter hunt. And when we all have a band of sheep and goats to sell every year we will say, long live the hunter and his dogs.
