Decisions Handed Down.

The following decisions in causes taken under advisement by Judge Hamilton, at the January term of circuit court in this county, have been received and filed in the county clerk's office, each under date of February 25, 1899, towit:

B. F. Jones vs. J. F. Stewart, county judge; J. L. Hyde, county

treasurer; W. R. Wakefield, and F. A. Godwin, county commissioners, and J. H. Lutz, county clerk.

This cause having been heard on the demurrer filed by the defendant, J. F. Stewart, to complaint of plaintiff, plaintiff appearing by his attorney, M. L. Pipes, and defendant appearing by his attorneys, C. E. Hawkins and W. S. McFadden, and the court having been taken under advisement, and the court now being fully advised, finds that the said demurrer should be overruled. It is therefore ordered that the said demurrer be, and is hereby overruled.


Plaintiff is entitled to have mortgage foreclosed and property sold, and proceeds to apply the same as payment on amount due on promissory note.

Decree—It is hereby ordered, judged and decreed that the real property described in complaint be sold as real property is sold under execution at law; that each of said defendants be barred of all equity of the redemption in aid to said premises; that proceeds be applied to the payment of the costs and expenses of such sale to \$60 attorney fees for bringing the suit, and to the sum of \$596.59 due plaintiff from defendants, B. F. Jones and C. B. Crosno, on the promissory note described in plaintiff's complaint, and accruing interest thereon; that after so applying the proceeds of sale, if there is any deficiency remaining unpaid to plaintiff on said promissory note, that plaintiff have a judgment against defendants, B. F. Jones and C. B. Crosno, therefor.

L. L. Swan vs. R. A. Bensell, administrator of the estate of Peter Hagin, deceased, Margaret Dowd, Thomas Dowd, et al.

Based upon the findings of the fact and law filed herewith in the above entitled court [circuit court of Lincoln county] and cause, it is hereby ordered, adjudged and decreed that the mortgage in plaintiff's amended complaint described, be foreclosed, and that each of said defendants, excepting A. T. Peterson, be barred of interest or equity of redemption in or to the following described mortgaged premises, towit: The sw $\frac{1}{4}$ of ne $\frac{1}{4}$ and ne $\frac{1}{4}$ of sw $\frac{1}{4}$, and e $\frac{1}{4}$ of nw $\frac{1}{4}$ of section 31, township 10 south, range 10 west, of Willamette meridian, containing 160 acres of land, in Benton county, state of Oregon; that all the right, title or interest of said defendants, excepting defendant above excepted, on the 20th day of November, 1891, or at any time hereinafter, be sold as real property is sold under execution at law, and the proceeds of such sale be applied, first, to the costs and expenses of such sale and to the costs of this suit to the sum of \$45, allowed plaintiff as an attorney fee for foreclosing the mortgage described in plaintiff's amended complaint herein, and to the payment of the sum of \$492.10, the amount due on plaintiff's said mortgage, and the overplus, if any there be, be paid to the clerk of this court, to be paid over as it may be further ordered by this court. That the defendants, A. T. Peterson and Eva Peterson, recover from their costs hereto incurred.
