EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

There are 2611 school children in Astoria.

Concerning the Alaskan boundary vivendi, will not a study of that same kind of an agreement in the sealing question be of some use to our officials?

The position assumed by W. J. Bryan, the boy orator of the Platte, naturally places in opposition to him all the leading men of the democratic party. He will find nomination, even, under these circumstances, a hard matter.

The settlement of the Alaskan boundary line is one not to be disposed of hastily. It will take much time, working as such investigating commissions usually work. In the meantime the miners have had one reported battle on Porcupine river. A temporary line will doubtless be established until the permanent one has been agreed upon. This has been asked by the English government and will be doubtless granted.

R. A. Bensell gave the Oregonian a few questions concerning the improvement of Yaquina harbor to answer a few days since. The Oregonian could see no benefit in giving the information desired and added that it had always fought to promote the work at Yaquina in every possible way. This may be true, but the LEADER knows scores of people who do not believe it and no kind of talk would lead them to believe it. And in connection with this mooted question, it is but proper to state that prominent men in all the Valley towns and some from Eastern Oregon are expressing a desire to be present when the board arrives and express to that board the wishes of the people among whom they live. Even San Francisco is interested and may be heard from at the proper time.

"Taxpayer" in last week's News makes several wild assertions, but allegation is not argument. He sings a regular calamity song and stoutly asserts that Waldport taxpayers will not assist in the building of the court house. Well, that depends, you know. Taxpayer and the LEADER are just alike in this matter, both have their say and that ends it. Without us there are still enough to carry the matter through. Did you ever hear a real energetic, enterprising, successful man talk like this? "I think it would be well enough to wait till the county is self supporting before talking court house. It will only take a few years more the way it is running to become bankrupt. County warrants won't be worth as

much as greenbacks were in time of war between the north and south, or what silver would have been worth had Bryan been elected President."

Such talk as this, spread about over the state is an excellent advertisement for Lincoln county. Taxpayers farm will raise in value very perceptibly as a result of such an advertisement—like the old lady kept tavern,—and especially when Lincoln county warrants are and have been selling at par. All such stuff is rot. A man is not very reasonable and logical who will defame his own home, and if he does not like this neck o' the woods, there is a wide expanse of water to the west and the roads are just as good as when he came in, and Lincoln county will not be depopulated or devastated when he walks out—into Benton.

PRO BONO PUBLICO.

Albany Creamery Report.

The annual report of E. J. Seeley, manager of the Albany creamery made at the beginning of the year of 1899, shows the excellent and successful work of the creamery.

During the preceding year we have handled 1,468,600 pounds of milk, with an average test of 4.03 per cent. of butter fat, making in all 59,271 pounds of butter fat, making therefrom 68,973 pounds of commercial butter, selling for the sum of \$45,330.74, an average of 22.4 cents per pound, paying to the patrons an average of 19.8 cents per pound. The lowest price for the year was 15 cents, which was paid for June and July butter. The highest price was 27 cents, which was paid for January butter, that being the highest price paid up to the present time. We find by referring to last year's report that we have handled 3770 pounds less butter fat, but have received for our output \$901.36 above the preceding year. We have received from the Shedd skimming station 27291 pounds of butter fat, making 31838 pounds of butter, at a cost to the Association delivered at the Creamery of \$838.65 or 2.6 cents per pound. The actual cost of manufacturing for the past year has been 4 cents per pound of all butter turned out by the Creamery, so it will be seen that a skimming station, run in conjunction with the Creamery, where a suitable amount of milk can be obtained, is a benefit.

Toledo Public School.

The seventh and eighth grade literary society elected a new set of officers for a term of six weeks, they are, president, Mae Lewis; vice president, Leland Collins; secretary, Ira Reeder; treasurer, Chas. Hyde; 1st critic, Prof. Holm; 2nd critic, Mamie Wakefield. Program committee, Prof. Holm, Chas. Hyde, Jesse Reeder; standing editor, Jesse Reeder; committee on morning entertainment, Everett Jones, Jesse Reeder, Mae Lewis.

Miss Taylor, teacher of the intermediate grades, being detained at the bedside of her sick mother, is unable to return this week. She fully expected to return Monday evening but the sudden illness of her mother prevented. Mamie Wakefield has charge of her school while she is absent.

The attendance of the seventh and eighth grade pupils was better last week than it has been since school begun. The average attendance being 92 per cent. and tardiness 98 per cent. The attendance of the primary grades is also improving, the average being excellent for such small children. They have been ahead of the larger ones the entire term, thus showing the earnestness with which they work.
