EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

Its astonishing low soon our people see many new ways of making money as soon as the hopes of being given it are blasted.

Senator Gorman is working hard to elect a democratic mayor for Baltimore, hoping thereby to advance his cause as a presidential candidate in 1900.

That is a fortunate locality whose people are self-reliant and wait for nothing to turn up, but up and turn something up. That sort of people succeed no matter what their environment. THE LEADER is pleased to notice that the people of this section are rapidly coming to this state and will soon become the most prosperous in the state.

W. J. Bryan is more in demand than ever. There are calls for him all over the country.—Albany Democrat. No doubt. People in every part of our broad land are always eager to see or hear one of Nature's freaks. W. J. Bryan is a lost cause. The people are expressing themselves so all over the United States.

Next week the court house proposition will come forward for action, unless it should be that the commissioners board make special business of this matter and delay it until the regular meeting has adjourned. Some preliminary work will doubtless be done. It cannot begin too quick and no one will kick if reason is used in the amount expended. A plain, commodious house, built not for ornament but for actual use and safety, is what the people want; nothing more.

This is funny. The engineers recommended \$10,000 appropriation for Coos bay. The government granted \$150,000. Then they left Yaquina out entirely, though there was much more reason for the appropriation. Will some one with a very big head explain it.—Democrat. The same railroad influence that delayed the Nicaragua canal also delayed the Yaquina project. Any tack-headed citizen can see that. The Portland board of trade also asked for the Coos money but forgot to mention Yaquina—purely an oversight.

Now is the time for towns in the Valley and in Eastern Oregon to make arrangements for their delegates to be present when the board of government engineers visit Yaquina Bay. Don't let the announcement that the board will be at Yaquina Bay on a certain day find no preparations made. It is to be sincerely hoped that this board may be thoroughly advised of the importance which nearly all Oregon places upon this improvement, and the great and never ceasing benefits which the farming class all over the state will derive from its completion. Let no delay be allowed, but let every town see that its proportion of the representation be ready to appear when needed.

The sooner our people find out for certain that they cannot afford to wait to be made comfortable and

well-to-do by an appropriation from the government or the extension to an eastern connection of the Corvallis & Eastern Ry., the sooner will Lincoln county begin to grow and prosper as it ought. These two enterprises will come. Do not doubt it. But do not sit and wait. Lay the foundation for your home and prosperity as though they were never to be. As children say, "Jes play there never was going to be a better harbor or a longer railroad." Then you will begin right, a factor which has never been very deeply considered here, though of great importance. Our county is not as prosperous as it should be. It is hard to admit this, but it is true. The fault is not the land, the climate, or anything of that sort. It is yours. With a better market, farmers could all prosper, but to open that market, first produce what you can sell and with that advertisement, open the way for others. Go to 'Frisco or Portland. There you can sell all you can raise of celery, winter apples, mohair, beef, hemp, butter, eggs, poultry, honey, fresh, salt and canned salmon. Now, send such a quality as will create a demand for more, and little by little buyers will come more often and soon you will have a market established for every product of this county. This is the only one way to bring prosperity. You cannot legislate it; if you wait for a railroad to bring it, you will die without even a glimpse of it; neither can you sit in the sun or by the stove and kick it into being. It never results from such causes. Produce that for which there is a demand and soon you can demand a market and a fair price. This article may be homely and not pleasant to the taste, but it is true. Ponder it well and change your tactics.
