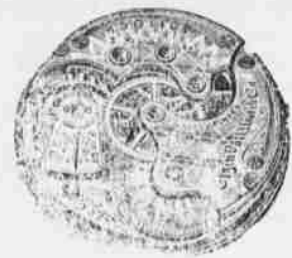

Siletz Bay Items.

Mr. Rush from Nestucca will soon move on a homestead on Devils Lake.

Jno. H. Kern has sold his interest in the cannery to Mr. Flynn of Albany a relative of C. P. Church another stockholder. This presumably places the management of the concern with these men. We hope they will take an interest in the development of our locality.

Albert Sijota with Joe Deleska who will soon move to Dayton Washington, made a trip to Toledo last week via the beach road, going one day, returning the next.

Supervisor Affolter with a half dozen faithful settlers worked three days on the above road last week. They got a horse trail opened up on the worst part of the road remaining to be opened, viz the 'Southside of Otter Rock hill, where the grade was established up on the side of the ridge instead of straight down the mountain. A half mile was worked on, many large logs being cut out.

Siletz Bay with her homesteaders is in as critical a situation as the Yaquina Bay improvement. Some will be compelled to move out. Others will take their places. Help and encourage them.
