EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

The organization of Wheeler county was completed last week.

Who will try to fill H. D. McGuire's position? It is no place for a novice.

Alger will resign when he returns and Gen. Warren Hastings will take his portfolio.

Eugene people will celebrate the opening of Lane county's new court house May 1.

The Roseburg Plaindealer is now an eight-column semi weekly. Long may it succeed!

Claud Branton, who killed John Linn in Lane county, has been sentenced and will be hanged May 12.

The National Press Association have been invited by the C. & E. company and the citizens of Albany to visit Albany and from there visit Newport. Thus a national association will see and enjoy a day on the beach at the Resort City, the finest ocean beach in Oregon.

Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon, Salem, Independence, Eugene and other Valley towns have elected delegates to meet the board of government engineers at Newport and lay before them statistics showing importance of the improvement to all Oregon people outside of the metropolis.

A biologist is examining Eastern oysters planted here three years ago. He finds that a few young Eastern oysters have hatched and grown. This proves that the Eastern oyster will propagate in Oregon waters. The young oysters found are evidently a year old. The government plant is in excellent condition. Some of the oysters have attained great size. The people of Yaquina bay are much in the experiment.

A. D. Hale, editor of The Peoples Press, visited Toledo Friday night. This office received a call. The Press is a dyed-in-the-wood populist paper. It has for its motto "We stand by the interest of the laboring men of this country." THE LEADER does the same thing, but sees nothing of interest to the laboring man in the tenets of populist policy. The motto is at least one every paper can conscientiously follow, however far apart they may be in their work for the aforesaid interest.

THE LEADER cannot but note the fact that the Steamer Weeot's house was badly stove in by the taking of a sea on Coos bar. Coos papers say there is plenty of water there and it is always smooth. The misfortune of others are not usually attacked by THE LEADER, but Coos papers have for a long time ridiculed Yaquina bar for nothing but jealous reasons. Coos bar is all right. Yaquina is of much greater importance because her improvement will make money, not for Yaquina people, but for the farmers of all Oregon except the northern counties, and even they

will be benefitted, by the higher prices paid here making competition sharper there.

Mr. Bryan's latest description of the republican party is, "The republican party came into existence in an attempt to apply the declaration of independence to the black man; it seems likely to go out of existence for its refusal to apply the principles to a brown man—only half black." There were many in the North at the close of the rebellion and the solid South that stood forth and said, "It never can be done." But it was done; neatly and completely. The world has said it was well done. Abraham Lincoln is not alive, but his teachings are, and no one better knows it than Mr. Bryan. Means for killing Codlin moth.

The Pacific Tree and Vine makes a very clear statement of the methods of fighting the codlin moth. It says that the best time to spray is very soon after the blossoms fall, and the projecting part of the calyx soon closes and retains it, in readiness for the young larva when it is old enough to eat. One should wait a little longer after the blossoms fall for pears than for apples, as the calyx cup does not close up so completely as in the apple. In about three weeks after the hatching, sometimes more, the larva eats its way out of the apple, and seeks a place to wind in a cocoon, from which it emerges in about two weeks as a moth ready to lay eggs again.

It burlap bands are around the tree when the larva comes out of the apple it will take refuge under them, and if these are examined every week they can all be killed. Do not leave the bands more than eight or nine days without examination. All other traps are practically useless.
