The Protection of Game.

Editor LEADER.

I promised some friends to write some for publication on this subject. I, like most of the settlers in this mountain county thought that I must have a dog and gun to protect from varmints and to secure meat. I spent precious time and some money to get a good dog over the effects of salmon, and succeeded in having one during most of 1880, but I soon saw that the gun was of far more value than the dog. And if the dogs increased with the settlers there would soon be no game. In 1885 and 86 I began to ask the neighbors to stop the dogs, and to be consistent I have not kept one. If our people had followed my example in this our children now could have many an exciting chase, such as we used to enjoy. And even yet in some localities if the dogs were stopt from running deer, birds or game of any kind there would soon be some of the old sportsman's charms. In short, stop the dog is all the game law we need. The gun and traps are a sufficient protection from varmints. Sheep and goat men should fear dogs more than varmints.

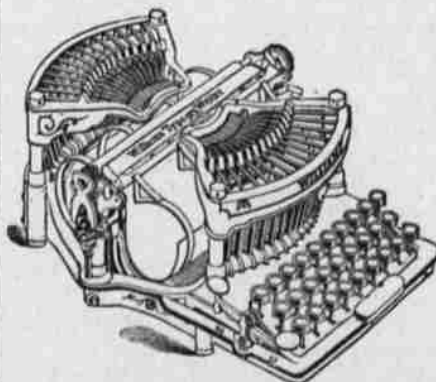
