Death of Daniel Murphy.

A dispatch late yesterday afternoon to Dr. N. B. Avery announces the death of Daniel Murphy, well known in Corvallis. The telegram mentioned no details, merely stating, "will start early in the morning with the corpse of Dan Murphy." Mr. Murphy had been ailing for several months. He was about 68 years of age and was a veteran of the Civil war. He has resided for the last 25 years in Benton county. The funeral will probably occur from the residence of Dr. N. B. Avery on Sunday. The interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.—Times.
