Teachers Examination.

Notice is hereby given that for the purpose of making an examination of all persons who may offer themselves as candidates for teachers of the schools of this county, the county school superintendent thereof will hold a public examination at the county court house, Toledo, Oregon, beginning at one o'clock Wednesday, May 10, 1899. Teachers eligible to state certificates, state diplomas, or state life diplomas, must present recommendation and make application at the same time.

Applicants not present at the opening will not be permitted to take the examination.

The following program will be followed during the May examination of applicants for county and state papers:

Wednesday, Penmanship, History, Spelling. Thursday, Written Arithmetic, Theory of Teaching Grammar.

Friday, Geography, Mental Arithmetic, Reading, Physiology, Composition, Physical Geography, Book-keeping, Oregon School Law, General History, English Literature, Algebra.
