EDITORIAL AND COMMENT.

After a hot fight of thirty minutes Aguinaldo and his followers threw down their arms and fled to the hills Monday. Gen. McArthur lost eight men. This gives the entire northern portion of Luzon to the Americans, and is thought ends the severe fighting, and Calumpet is in our hands.

Once more the hopes of our people have been built up. The meeting at Newport again stimulated to life the hopes cast down by the action of the late congress. The hope is a laudable one. The effect of the improvement would benefit all Oregon and portions of other states. There is but one fear to be expressed and that is that it may cause some of our people to again become lethargic and cease to make the most of all their opportunities. Don't do it. Keep up the good work commenced of late and more, and our county with its earnest settlers will prosper and grow.

Every month shows a little improvement in our little city. New families are coming every week. New business enterprises are being launched forth. New buildings, residences and business buildings erected. The growth is slow, to be sure, but no steps are being taken backward. The one prosperous, growing, advancing town in Lincoln is Toledo. Through good and bad times alike she has moved forward. THE LEADER only wishes it could say as much for other towns in Lincoln, because through their prosperity Toledo would still be more prosperous. Our city has yet much to do and the pull ahead is a constant one with no resting at the foot of the hill. May she ever prosper!

"As ye sow so shall ye reap." The republican party has for a quarter of a century been sowing high protection ideas and now is reaping the harvest of trusts and combines.—Baker City Record.

Your quotation, Bro. Bowen, is at least poorly chosen. Referring to the democratic party "As ye sow, so shall ye reap," does not carry out well, because there is a further admonition which said something about "If ye sow the wind, ye shall reap the cyclone." The democratic party is reaping the cyclone, hence, must have used poor judgment in its choice of seed. Trusts will prove simply tares in the wheat and the republican party will doubtless pull them up and consign them to the flames.

Captain Hart said or intimated that the board would cause a survey of the bay and bar before making its report. This being done, the argument of complicated difficulties here not found at other Pacific bars, will be wiped off the slate. It is a mistake. No such difficulties will be found. These ideas have grown out of the adverse Symon's report and may have been fertilized by the later complaint made by some of our people, that the groins built from the jetties toward the channel would have the

effect of filling it up. These matters will be all straightened out by the survey and THE LEADER greatly desires that it be done, considering it a strong point in our favor.

Not all the voters of this county are aware of the fact that before they go to the polls again to cast their ballots it will be necessary for them to be registered in order to be a qualified elector. The Harmon registering bill introduced at the regular session of the last legislature became a law, and it is now in full force and effect. As the law is interpreted, a registering official will be in each precinct at a specified time to receive the voters name, age, occupation, height, weight, color of hair and eyes, previous occupation, place of birth, whether a naturalized citizen or not, and a few other little points concerning appearance and character, just to make sure he is entitled to the full right of suffrage in this big country of ours, said official to be a person authorized to administer an oath, and if voter fails to present himself for register he will probably not be allowed to cast his much praised little ballot. Voters should beware of this law, should it be enforced, and conduct themselves accordingly.—Union.

At the Chicago democratic dollar dinner Mr. Bryan said. "There can be no harmony between those whose opinions as antagonistic as the opinions set forth in the Chicago platform and the Indianapolis platform." W. J. Bryan's hopes lies outside the great cities and his followers are outspoken in their determination to severely let alone the other portion of the democratic party. They will take the Chicago platform in its entirety, without change as Mr. Bryan says every plank in that is stronger now than it was in 1896. To it will be added opposition to the present administration's acts in the Spanish islands. The issue between the two wings of the party are plain and open and give opportunity to decide by an open fight which wing is the democracy and which is not. Plenty of time is also given for a fully considered, mature decision on the part of every democrat in the land as some year or more intervenes between these declarations and the national convention. The gold-democrats know now just what they are fighting and can govern themselves accordingly. THE LEADER believes this to be their opportunity but we shall see what we shall see.

It is now stated positively that Mr. Hammond has made all arrangements to have sleepers attached to every Saturday train from Albany to Yaquina, returning Monday. This improved service will bring many to Newport during the summer season who, otherwise would spend their Sundays at some other resort. Newport is certain to be the Resort City of Oregon. Nature has been more lavish with Newport and her adjacent points than any other coast city in Oregon.

Radir, a well known man in these parts and a former resident of Yaquina and Newport, is dead, being poisoned it is supposed by some sort of canned goods eaten by himself and party while viewing a large tract of land to be sold to a Pennsylvania company for from \$500,000 to one million dollars. There were four in the party and three were found dead quite a distance apart and showing no violence. Later news will doubtless corroborate the poison theory. Will was a great rustler and Oregon can ill afford to lose him.
