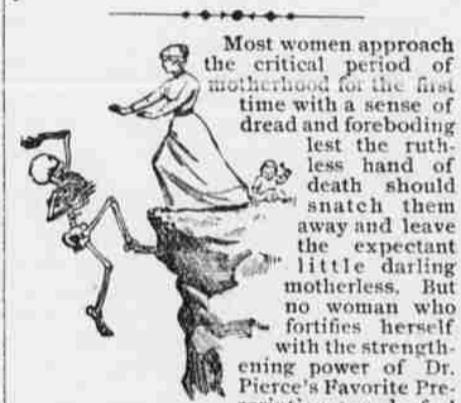
Bert Bolles leaves the first of the week and W. H. Buoy takes his old position.

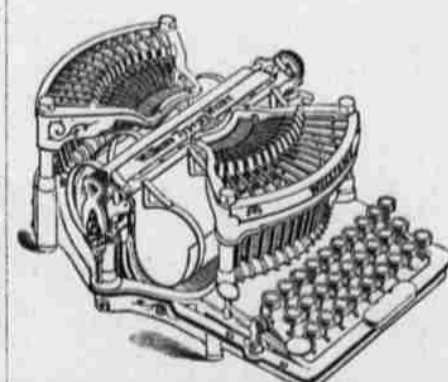
