About Oregon Mines.

CORNUCOPIA, June 11, 1899.

EDITOR LEADER:—As I have
agreed to write to many of my
friends, I take the opportunity of
writing to them all through the
columns of THE LEADER. I have
traveled through all the mining
sections of the country and have
met with many mining men.

At the Columbia mine, located
thirty miles west of Baker City, is
working full blast and employing
55 men. Three weeks ago they
cleaned up 45 pounds of gold.

The Golconda mine has the latest
process, the bromine-chlorine pro-
cess, and has been running three
weeks. It is run by electricity and
has the finest machinery I ever
saw. It is not worked down to a
fine point yet as this is the second
plant in the United States and cost
\$150,000. As it is three times the
size of the other plant its present
work is along the line of an experi-
ment, but is certain to succeed.

The E. & E. mine, one and one-
half miles from the Golconda, is
running full blast and is a success.
I am at Cornucopia. The Youth's
Companion is running at a great
profit to its owners.

Other mines are doing their as-
sessments and their ore is fine.

This season promises to record
the greatest output of gold here
ever known. The Seven Devils
district is causing great excitement
and is very rich in copper and car-
ries some gold.

Hundreds of men are prospect-
ing in the mountains already.

Seventy-five thousand dollars
have been offered for a single mine
here.

Fourteen men, experts, came in
to buy the Youths Companion and
that group. As yet no one knows
the price paid if they are sold.

There were 14 feet of snow at
Cornucopia but it is gone in the
streets and but 7 feet are left in the
mountains. Pine Valley is one of
the best markets here, as the copper
mines are at the mouth of Pine
creek and these other mines all
around it. Eagle Valley is also a
fine valley and both are in Union
county. Till some future time I am

The report of the grand jury at
Wardner was as follows: "In ac-
cordance with your charge, we
have carefully examined into all

nored the same. There being no
further business before us, we ask
to be discharged." Accompanying
the report was a large mass of in-
dictments. There were about 50,
but it is admitted that many con-
tained numerous names, so that the
number indicted will remain un-
known.

vicinity.

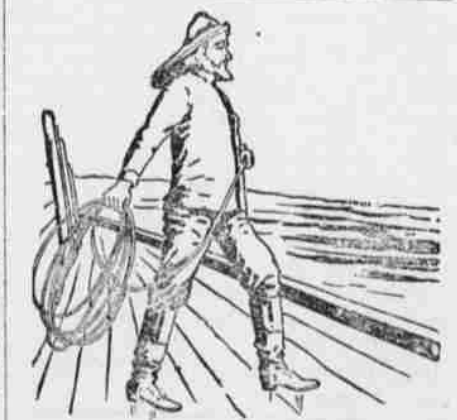
