Improvements.

What is Recorded at Siletz for 1899.

Knowing our many readers would be interested in any improvements made within the boundaries of our county, we have taken Time by the forelock and visited the Siletz with a view to writing it up for their quiet perusal by the home fireside.

We found that, although Agent T. J. Buford had been in charge but a little over a year, he has made wonderful changes in the way of improvements, and secured for the Indians the expenditure of about \$10,000; more than has been spent for improvements on the Siletz for a number of years.

THE HOSPITAL

was the first item secured and is now receiving the finishing touches from the hands of the workmen preparatory to being launched upon a career of usefulness in a field heretofore unoccupied. It is a substantially built frame structure having three wards, each to contain three beds, a bath room holding two tubs, a kitchen and nurse's room. It is beautifully plastered and finished inside and is furnished with the best of ventilation and water. The agent and the doctor are greatly pleased at having secured this much needed convenience, because it will be the means of saving many lives that without it would be lost. Every school patient will be under the direct care and control of the physician, a condition never having been before. Physicians have always complained because their instructions are seldom if ever heeded. This will now be obviated and the results cannot but be far in advance of anything possible in the past.

THE CLERK'S DWELLING

has heretofore been quite a distance from the office in an old building. Through Mr. Buford's labors the department has made an allowance for a new building, and that, too, is nearly completed and ready for occupancy. It stands just across the road from the blacksmith shop and is a square, one-story building with an ell and contains five large, well lighted rooms, nicely arranged for utility and convenience.

But the cap sheaf of Mr. Buford's work this year is his new

WATER SUPPLY

for the hospital and boarding school. One and one-eighth miles from the school buildings, on the side of a high, heavily wooded hill, runs a large, clear, cool spring of pure water. At this spring, and receiving its entire outflow, has been built upon a solid foundation, a strong concrete reservoir with a capacity of 5,000 gallons. Pipe has been laid under the ground the entire distance except where it crosses two deep canyons, and here it reposes in six-inch boxes nicely packed in sawdust and permanently supported by strong horses.

This spring will in the future supply the school and hospital with water as pure, clear and cool as can be found in any part of these United States. This work cannot be too highly appreciated by the Siletz people, and other citizens of this county may well be proud of any agent through whose influence such conveniences can be obtained from the Indian department.

Mr. Buford has also built a new, clean and strong jail containing six cells and a kitchen for the safe confinement of wrongdoers. Next to the jail has been erected a neat and commodious building for the regular sessions of Indian court.

And last, but not least, there will yet this year be built a Dining Room and Kitchen for the boarding school. Bids for this large building have already been advertised for.

Thus Mr. Buford has secured for the people of Siletz a number of much needed buildings and has also enriched Lincoln county to the extent of nearly or quite \$10,000, and both the Siletz people and the other people in our county should appreciate this work and should not fail to give to Agent Buford and the McKinley administration such praise and appreciation as the results merit.
