Care of the Orchard.

This is the time of year when the young orchard suffers most from lack of tillage and proper treatment of wood growth. Just now when the farmer is busy haying he feels that he cannot let the hay wait a day or two till he cultivates the orchard. The result is that a thifty crop of weeds springs up, sucks the water out of the soil, the terminal buds stop growing and the tree is stunted; and all through its life it feels the effect of the shock. There is only one way in which to grow good, thrifty, vigorous, paying trees and that is by giving them the best of care the first two or three years, and the time when those trees most need care is now, just as the soil begins to get dry.

Then another point about their care is that at this time the young orchardist would do well to remove the excess of branches. Suppose, for instance, that one wants to start a head with four or three main branches, it will be good practice to remove the smallest branches of this year's growth until no more than the required number are left. This will result in turning all the force of the tree's vigor into the required branches, instead of forming a quantity of undesirable wood which sooner or later must be cut off and thrown away, thus saving unto the tree much of what is usually thrown away.—Experiment Station.

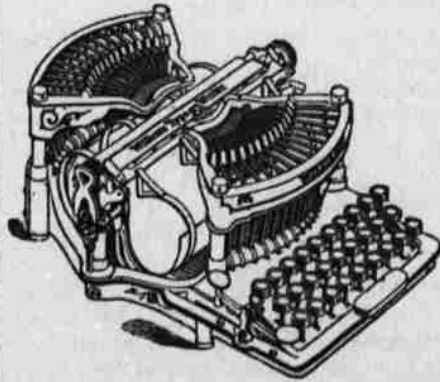
