Charles Harwood, of Florence, who has been nicely advertised as the defamer of Yaquina bay, has caused Weatherston to publish "Some Remarks" in the West. His first paragraph says something like this, A serviceable God-given quality in a man is the requisite amount of horse sense to mind his own business." The man at our elbow says, "Correct, Mr. Harwood, for once in your doubtless lofty career, you are correct, and had you possessed the above-mentioned amount of horse sense to mind your own business, the article on Yaquina Bay, would never have been published." The aforesaid man at our elbow is correct, yea, verily! Harwood, however gains some solace. He is pleased that the writer "emitted his vomit in the Yaquina swill tub." Ha, Ha! The trend of his thought is again erroneous. It didn't seem to enter his mind that the West, containing his thoughts was too full of swill to accommodate anything else.

Concerning the present national problems, Senator Morgan says some very good things. As they follow, you can judge for yourself. "Those who lament and decry the conduct of our government in dealing with the Philippines as being violative of our constitution are too late to accomplish much else than to echo the pathetic appeals of Aguinaldo, that we do not destroy our own government in order to save the natives from the fatal power of his dictatorship. It is not far to go, nor is the way obscure, to find in the constitution of the United States express power given to congress to do what was done in

Louisiana and Hawaii, and what our self respect compels us to do in the Philippines."

"The causes of our war with Spain originated in the necessity of self-protection which Mr. Jefferson predicted in the beginning of this century. That necessity increased with every revolutionary struggle in that island, until a civil war in Cuba caused the uncontrollable intervention of our people and their open disregard of our neutrality laws. The remedy that any other power would have enforced, under like circumstances, would have been the seizure of Cuba and the annexation of the richest and most desirable island in the Western hemisphere. But we voluntarily subordinated these great advantages to our sense of national duty, and gave to Cuba her liberty at the cost of war with a powerful enemy.

"We made her people free to choose between separate independence and antonomy and the higher privilege of becoming a state in the American Union. We still interpose the Monroe doctrine for her protection against European subjugation, if she should prefer to take her place among the independent American republics. Conditions of equal advantage have been and are still available to the Filipinos, when these people are prepared to enjoy and protect their liberties. But a faction in these islands, the burdens of whose oppressions have rendered them incapable of confidence in the humanity of foreign powers, and whose estimate of liberty is only measured by the desire of personal security that a master can give a slave, led by men whose business it is to speculate in human blood, refuse to grasp the hand of benevolence extended to save them, and compel us to teach them that obedience to lawful authority is the first lesson in self-government. The task is ours, because it is self-imposed by our devotion to the principles of free government, whose cardinal tenet is that liberty regulated by law is the sheet anchor of all the rights that good government can secure to mankind."

"The flag we have planted in the Philippines is consecrated to the same liberties it shelters on the capitol at Washington. It can never become the emblem of tyranny or a shelter for oppression."

Ex-President Harrison, along the same line, said in a speech in Paris, "It is too late to debate the question whether it were wiser to carry out in the Philippines a pure naval campaign or the question whether destiny or our own choice involved us there. We have assumed responsibilities toward the people there, toward Spain and toward the world. We must establish order as a preliminary to the consideration of any questions as to the ultimate destiny and disposition of the archipelago."
