DROWNED.

WHILE DEEP-SEA FISHING ON YAQUINA BAR.

Life-Saving Crew Rescued Frank Priest and Sea Lion Charlie.

At near 7 o'clock yesterday morning George Burch, Frank Priest and Sea Lion Charlie went over the Yaquina bar in a small boat to catch deep-sea fish for the summer tourists, now enjoying themselves at Newport.

They began to fish near the bar and were busily engaged when a large breaker was discovered nearly upon them. Quick as thought Frank Priest turned the boat bow on sufficiently to take the breaker without injury, but before the boat could be righted a second time, another breaker rushed upon them and filled and capsized it. Messrs. Priest and Sea Lion Charlie clung to the boat as soon as they could make their way to it, but they saw no more of their companion, George Burch. He was probably struck by the boat and immediately sank.

Luckily for the others, one of the Yaquina Bay Life-Saving crew was patrolling the beach near by the scene and saw the accident. With all speed he flew to the station and gave the alarm, when Cap't Clark and his crew launched a boat and rowed for life to the scene of the accident, arriving just in time to rescue Messrs. Priest and Sea Lion Charlie, who had clung to the upturned boat nearly as long as possible.

These men were in the almost ice-cold breakers for upwards of half an hour, buffeted about in a manner which you and I wish never to know, and were almost exhausted from exertion and cold.

Great praise should be given to Captain Clark and his crew for the part they took in the rescue.

While such an item is not entirely unexpected, the death of one so well and favorably known as Geo. Burch, was a terrible shock to our people, and a sympathetic expression arose to every lip from every heart.
