yellow-legged chickens in course of
preparation for an epicurean palate.

We had not been long in the
parlor when a couple entered, fol-
lowed by others; a certificate was
presented, bearing the signature of
our County Clerk, and in less than
ten minutes Miss Florence Helms
became Mrs. Charles Webb. Then
all repaired to another room where
the festal board fairly groaned with
its abundance of nicely prepared
good things.

In the evening we preached to a
full house in Waldport. This is a
thriving place; everything and
everybody is on the move. Chas.
Diven is kept busy tying up goods,
while two other stores are also do-
ing a good business.

The barge Dewey is loading
with two hundred cords of stove
bolts, while the other one is load-
ing with lumber from the Harrison
sawmill. Chas. Diven and Mr.
Harrison junior have leased the
mill for two years. They have a
new engine to use in their logging
camp and when they are fully pre-
pared will give employment to 40
men.

It has been 8 years since we vis-
ited Waldport and many changes
have occurred. There are many
good stock farms here to be taken
by settlers, who will be among
Christians enjoying regular Sabbath
School, prayer and class meetings.

The Codling Moth.

Those who have apples to save
from the ravages of the codling
moth should spray them at once if
they have not already done so. The
first larvae are now entering the
fruit and by the time this notice
reaches the public it will be almost
too late to expect the best results.
Prompt action will be necessary to
save the crop.

Moths are abundant and each de-
posits many eggs. Apples are
scarce. The natural inference is
that unusual efforts will have to be
made to save fruit that remains.
Observation last season showed that
the larvae of the first brood began
to work in the fruit about July 1st.
This year they are beginning some-
what earlier. This brood did little
damage last year, but it produced
an enormous second brood which
began work about August 1st, by
far the greater proportion of injury
being done after September 1st.
We, therefore, recommend that the
trees be sprayed once between June
1st and July 1st, again about Aug-
ust 1st and again early in Septem-
ber. Directions for preparing and
applying the spray are contained
in Bulletin No. 48 which may be
had on application.—Experiment
Station.
