We are not wholly unknown to the LEADER readers, having been connected with the paper in some capacity for the greater part of its existence. Our effort shall be to run as good a local paper as possible, keeping in view at all times the advancement of the county, and the town in which we live. In doing this we need the mutual help and assistance of the people of the town and county and trust that this will be given.

New Enterprise.

Some four weeks since from the state of Minnesota came Charles B. Mason and his mother, a sister of our predecessor, for the purpose of engaging exclusively in the raising of goats.

Being thoroughly pleased with this country as the proper place in which to launch into his chosen vocation, Mr. Mason has lost no time in making his preparatory movements. Tuesday he filed on a claim about a mile and a half from Eddyville and Wednesday went to that place to begin work.

The greater part of this fall will be utilized in making ready for his flock. He will erect ample barn room for his entire flock, keeping but a small number in a place, and so arranging them that they will be accessible at any time for the flock and be warm and dry.

From B. F. Grant of Harlan he has purchased sixty head and will go to the valley later and finish his flock.

Mr. Mason is a young man of good habits and well used to the careful caring of good stock, and will doubtless make a success of this business. He is a great lover of stock and this, also, will tend toward his success.

When his flock has been gathered together and multiplied a couple of years, he will have one of the largest flocks of goats in

Oregon. His intention is to begin grading up at once and to make by degrees his entire flock a high grade of Angora.

In the meantime our people will watch with great interest his success in this line, for it is becoming more and more a subject of interest in this county. Many of our farmers are expressing their intention to work into goatraising as soon as possible, and should Mr. Mason succeed fairly well, it will give it an impetus which could be secured in this locality by an actual demonstration that they are a success. Success to him. We predict that when he proves up on his claim he will be one of the most prosperous men in Lincoln county.

Mr. Mason senior, with two grown girls and boys, will arrive late in September and settle somewhere in Oregon, probably near Corvallis or Medford. He is a well-to-do farmer and will prove quite an addition to that locality in which he determines to settle.

Captain Harts, United States engineer, who has returned to Portland from a trip to Yaquina states that the survey steamer, H. G. Wright, which was overhauled and commissioned to make a survey of the entrance to Yaquina bay, to obtain information required by the board of engineers who are to report upon the advisability of continuing the improvements there, has completed the survey. The field work is in the hands of Capt. Harts, and the maps will be completed in a few days. They will be submitted to the board, which will probably meet early in August. Although the work has not been platted, sufficient proof is given that the channel into Yaquina bay has been straightened and deepened, and the crest of the bar has apparently been forced out to sea some 500 feet, showing a decided improvement over the conditions four years ago when the last survey was made.—Oregonian.

J. G. Holcombe today received a telegram notifying him of his appointment as engineer on the Inter-ocean Commission, leaving New York on August 5th. To the many friends of Mr. Holcombe in Oregon, this will be highly gratifying and will be recognized as a deserved compliment to an engineer of ability. His former service on the survey of the Great Canal will be of much value. We have been favored with gentlemen of skill and practical knowledge for the improvement here, but none have been more thorough and conscientious in the discharge of their duty than Mr. Holcombe. We bid him a safe journey and predict advancement and a successful future.—Newport News.

Kindness is an efficient aid in increasing milk yield and costs nothing. The more a milker can make his cow love him as she loves her calf, the more milk she will give him. Investigations show that it is probable that a considerable portion of the milk is secreted during the operation of milking, especially the rich milk which comes last. Abuse and excitement reduce the secretion and not only lower the quantity of milk given, but often lower the percentage of butter fat. Kindness and petting make the cow contented and put her nervous system in such a condition that the fullest yield is given. This is not the only cause, but it is a chief cause, of the wide variation in butter fat sometimes shown in creamery tests. Hurrying cows, running them with dogs, beating them or speaking roughly to them will reduce the yield of milk and per cent. of butter fat. A change of milkers will often lower the per cent. of butter fat until the cow becomes fond of the new milker.
