A School Census.

Prof. J. H. Ackerman, state superintendent of public instruction, has filed with the state treasurer a list of the counties showing the number of children in each of the counties, as per the school census taken in the various districts under the direction of the county superintendents. It is upon this census that the money derived from the interest of the irreducible school fund will be apportioned on August 1st by the state board of land commissioners. The money so apportioned will be about \$200,000, as compared to \$156,903.60 last year.

The total number of children last year was 130,753, while the enumeration this year shows 132,388, divided among the following counties:

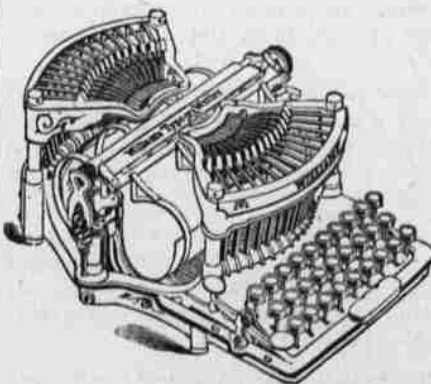
