Last Monday evening W. C. Monroe and James Doty came up from Alsea Bay, and made a complaint before the county judge that Mrs. Martha Robinette, living near Lutjens, was suffering from acute insanity. Accordingly a warrant was issued and placed in Sheriff Ross' hands, who went to Alsea Bay and brought the unfortunate woman to Toledo, arriving here about 10:30 Tuesday night. Upon an examination held before the county judge she was pronounced insane and was committed to the asylum, Sheriff Ross leaving for that place with her Wednesday. This is the second time the unfortunate woman has been committed to the asylum, the previous commitment being some eight or nine years ago. Her mania is of an acute form and at times she becomes quite violent, threatening those around her, and attempting to entirely disrobe herself.

Albany has raised the \$12,000 subsidy, with water privileges, required to secure the establishment in that city of the \$250,000 sawmill plant by the Curtiss Lumbering Co., and active operations are expected to begin in a few days. The mill is guaranteed to saw 250,000 feet per day.

Boston will mark the spot on Dorchester heights from which Washington saw the British evacuate the city with a \$25,000 tower. It will be built of bricks molded in the shape of beans, the trimmings will be of terra cotta twisted into spoons, and the memorial tablet will be of brown stone, the exact shade of brown bacon. At the summit will be placed lookouts of bowed glasses, and the whole will be in the best style of the latest Atheinian art. No money will now be spared in the attempt to keep the ancient history of the town in mind—"lest we forget—lest we forget."

The plan of operation of the new corporation, known as the Salem & Pacific Railroad Company, incorporated in Dallas last week, is to float their bonds immediately, which will be done by a well-known Portland man of experience in the line, then work will be commenced at Falls City and will be completed to the river by the way of Dallas, after which the western end will be extended to Newport or some other point on the coast. The western terminus has not been definitely settled. The object of the road is to tap the fine body of timber between Dallas and the coast, and open up the granite quarries of the Rock-creek country and the splendid sand-stone quarries west of Dallas. Four miles of this road between Dallas and Falls City are already graded, and the ties, bridges and culverts are ready for the road-bed. This work becomes the property of the new corporation on the commencement of work by them.—Oregonian.
